Message from Dr. Michael



Dear TCIS Family,

I would like to share several important updates and announcements with our community.

Please be informed that the King Kaew Road U-Turn near our campus will be closed for road surface repairs beginning Thursday, March 5, 2026, and is expected to remain closed for 4–6 weeks.

We kindly ask parents to allow extra travel time in the mornings and afternoons and to plan alternative routes during this period. Student safety remains our priority, and we appreciate your patience and cooperation.

Each year, we carefully balance our academic calendar to provide meaningful global and experiential learning opportunities. We are currently considering participation in the World Scholar's Cup (WSC) in November. If we formally host or fully participate in WSC during that period, we will hold Week Without Walls at the same time this year, as both events require significant preparation and resources and time away from campus.

Participation in WSC typically involves ticket costs and travel expenses. Scholarships for WSC participation are reviewed year by year based on need, merit, and available funding.

For the upcoming academic year, TCIS will continue offering athletic scholarships and in the future looking to offer music and art scholarships. We remain committed to recognizing student excellence and will continue to review scholarship structures annually.

Our new model classroom prototype will be completed by the end of April. This project reflects our commitment to innovative learning spaces that support collaboration, flexibility, and student engagement.

Parents of students in Grades 1–4 and Grades 9–12 will be invited to visit and provide recommendations before we expand the model further. Your voice and partnership are important as we continue to enhance our facilities.

TCIS is currently seeking two qualified Mathematics teachers for next academic year. We are committed to hiring experienced and dynamic educators who can support students across all levels, including advanced mathematics courses.

We are pleased to share that the following teachers will be joining TCIS next year: Japanese Teacher, Dance Teacher, Design & Technology Teacher, and Additional teachers for Grades 1, 2, 3, and 4

As our student enrollment grows, strengthening our elementary program remains a priority.

Thank you to the overseas Chinese Affairs Committee for the “115 Spring Festival Cultural Delegation” who came to school and presented to our school as well as our amazing FASCA and Drum teams. It was a great performance.

Dear Parents,

Chinese TOCFL

The TOCFL (Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language) is scheduled for April 02. It is a standardized Mandarin proficiency exam for non-native speakers. It evaluates listening and reading skills across three main bands (A, B, C) and six levels, focusing heavily on traditional characters.

It is used to assess growth and proficiency for placement. It also provide students experience with it because in the future they will need it for academic admission to Taiwanese universities, applying for the Taiwan Scholarship, and securing employment.

Academic Competitions

Last week middle school Model United Nations debate team had an amazing performance. This weekend our World Scholar's Cup students are competing against a very large group of international students from the Kingdom. The following week, Model United Nations team will once again compete.


Student's Special Achievements Section: Piew Golf (G5)

Dear Parents and Guardians,

I hope you are doing well! I wanted to share a quick update about what has been happening in 5th Grade English Language Arts.

Over the past week, students worked on transforming their argumentative essays into formal speeches. They practiced adjusting their writing for an audience, strengthening their delivery, and speaking with confidence. Speeches were graded using the PVLEGS framework (Poise, Voice, Life, Eye Contact, Gestures, and Speed), which helps students focus on strong presentation skills in addition to strong content. I am so proud of the growth I saw in every student. Congratulations to our class winners, **Piper** and **Goody**, for their outstanding speeches! Looking ahead, we are shifting our focus back to reading skills within argumentative texts. Students are practicing how to identify an author's claim, reasoning, evidence, counterclaim, and rebuttal. These skills are essential as we prepare for more complex reading and writing tasks. There will be a short quiz this Friday to assess these skills, and our full unit test will take place next Friday, March 13.

Dear Parents,

Over the past few weeks, students have been working hard on developing their literary essay writing skills. We have been focusing on writing strong thesis statements that include a character, a clear trait, and three supporting reasons. Students are learning how to support their ideas with strong text evidence and explain how that evidence proves their point. We have also been practicing writing thoughtful conclusions that leave the reader with a lasting statement.


In addition, we are now halfway through our class novel, *Holes* by Louis Sachar. Students have been engaging in discussions, analyzing characters, and identifying important themes and conflicts within the story.

As we move forward, students will complete a literary essay project presentation. In this project, they will analyze a character from *Holes* and demonstrate the elements they have learned about essay writing, including crafting a strong thesis, organizing body paragraphs with clear reasons and evidence, and writing an effective conclusion.

Please continue to support your child at home by encouraging them to read carefully, discuss the novel, and practice explaining their thinking using evidence from the text. Your support makes a meaningful difference in their growth as readers and writers.


Dear Parents,

We are approaching the end of Quarter 3 and the students have been working hard! This week we started our Essential Research Skills For Teens unit. This unit consists of developing an argumentative essay and speech in the form of a TED Talk. Students get to select a topic they are passionate about, search for credible sources, and develop an essay that can later be transformed into a speech. We started out the unit earlier this week by doing a TED Talk group assignment where students and the peers at their table selected a TED Talk and analyzed it. Then, students were able to select their topic.

Today students began finding credible sources to use in developing their essay. Over the next few weeks students will learn how to create strong hook statements, how to give a proper speech, and how to grab an audience and readers. I'm excited to see the passionate topics students have chosen and how amazing their essays and speeches will develop.

As always, please continue encouraging our scholars to do independent reading at home and to ask for help in class if they need more support. I'm looking forward to a great Quarter 4 soon!




Dear Parents,

It's been a busy month in ELL! We completed Unit 8 on comparatives, superlatives, and adjectives of feeling and personality. This language allows students to express themselves more precisely by comparing objects and beings at different levels. Now, students have the skills to develop their ideas more deeply.

Students are currently completing a four paragraph Opinion Essay for their Unit 8 Major Assessment. In this assessment, students have chosen a topic, stated their opinion, and developed five sentence paragraphs for two main reasons they have that opinion. Now, they are practicing how to write relevant introduction and conclusion paragraphs, and we'll revise, edit, and type to submit a polished essay. Taking the process step by step makes it a much more manageable task.

I've been very impressed with the students' creativity in this project. From choosing their topics to the reasons to further develop, students are demonstrating their abilities go beyond simple answers. While many were uncertain about how to write so much about a single topic, they've shown they are absolutely capable! Below you will find photos hard at work as well as our hamburger visual for structuring their essays.





Dear Parents,

Here's what each grade level is currently working on:

- **Grade 5:** Students are working on adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators, building strong foundational skills in fraction operations and problem-solving.
- **Grade 6:** Students are working on operations that involve the distributive property, learning how to simplify expressions and apply multiplication across addition and subtraction within parentheses.
- **Grade 7:** Students are learning how to find the area and circumference of a circle, applying formulas and solving real-world problems involving circles.
- **Pre-Algebra:** Students will soon begin Unit 4, which includes topics in Functions, Geometry, and Measurement.



Dear Parents,

- **Grade 6 Math:** Students are working on the order of operations that involve the distributive property, learning how to simplify expressions and apply multiplication across addition and subtraction within parentheses. Working with exponents, decimals and fractions to solve numerical and algebraic expressions.
- **Grade 6 Science:** Is continuing its study on wind and water. The students modeled the water cycle and explained all the different processes. They will continue to look at wind and water with the emphasis on weather patterns.
- **Grade 5 Science:** Stars and Planets. In this unit, students explore our solar system. They investigate how bright the Sun appears from each planet. We will also investigate gravity on other planets to discover patterns of this incredible force.





Dear Parents,

During the last few weeks in PreAlgebra students have dove deeper into geometrical concepts! We have covered a unit on angles, segments and triangles, looking at the various kinds of angle relationships. We have also completed a unit comparing the differences between similarity and congruence. Furthermore, we have learned about the four kinds of transformations: reflection, translation, rotation and dilation. Students will complete their final quarter exam on Friday, March 7th. During the last week of the quarter, we will complete a project on transformations where students will build an old vs. new floor plan for a design of their choice.

During quarter 4, we will be covering units including the properties of quadrilaterals, surface area and volume of 3D shapes, a unit on probability and statistics and we will conclude the quarter with a unit on radicals, Pythagorean Theorem and an introduction to Algebra 1 with students investigating some basic factoring skills! Dear TCIS Families,

Today's letter comes so soon after the last one, but I thought to think ahead and give you some suggestions on how to honor Earth Day in your home, in advance of Earth Day on April 22. This falls the week after Songkran, so how better to recognize what should be done every day? Songkran is a joyful celebration, but there is great potential to waste water during the hottest time of year, and when we lack rainfall. This year, try these observation and reflection activities with your student. We will be sharing them in classes.

Before Songkran:

- Track your household's daily water usage for one week
- Observe: How long do showers take? How much water is used for dishes, laundry, or gardening?
- Calculate: How many liters of water does your family use in a typical day?

During Songkran:

- Use a bucket instead of a hose for water play
- Keep track of how much water your family uses during the holiday
- Compare this to your normal daily usage

After Songkran:

- Reflect: How much extra water did we use? Could we have celebrated with less?
- Discuss: What are traditions we can keep while being more mindful of water conservation?

Sharing Your Findings

Students will share their observations and reflections in several ways:

- Written reflections: What surprised you? What will you change?
- Data collection: Charts or graphs showing before/after comparisons
- Action plans: What is one habit your family will change?
- Photo documentation: Before and after pictures of changes made

We will celebrate these efforts and share findings in class after the Songkran break.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

It has been an engaging and energetic time in Social Studies! I'm excited to share what both our 7th and 8th graders have been working on.

Our 7th graders are now fully immersed in our Ancient Greece unit. They recently wrapped up their geography and religion notes, building a strong understanding of how Greece's landscape influenced city-states and daily life, as well as how belief systems shaped culture and values. Students also completed a vocabulary quiz on major Greek gods and goddesses to reinforce key figures from mythology. We are now beginning a gods and goddesses comparison mini-essay, where students will analyze similarities and differences between deities while practicing clear organization, use of evidence, and structured paragraph writing.

Meanwhile, our 8th graders are studying key thinkers from the Scientific Revolution and the Enlightenment. To bring this era to life, students are creating "Wanted" posters that examine why their assigned thinker might have been viewed as dangerous by the Church and/or the state. Afterward, they will switch roles and become defense attorneys, arguing why their thinker should not be found guilty. This activity challenges students to understand historical context, analyze competing perspectives, and support claims with strong evidence. Both grade levels continue to grow in their ability to think critically and support their ideas with evidence. Thank you, as always, for your continued support.

📖 G6 CMT – Discovering “Moments of Life”

G6 CMT students are currently exploring the unit “**Moments of Life**.” Through readings that include classical poetry and narrative texts such as *Qing Ping Le: Village Life* and *Spring*, students learn how writers observe nature and everyday scenes to capture meaningful moments.

By discussing these texts and reflecting on their ideas, students are learning to slow down, observe the world around them, and discover writing inspiration from daily life.

📖 Q3 Reading – *The Education of Little Tree*

After six weeks of reading and reflection, our study of *The Education of Little Tree* concluded with a **Socratic seminar**. Throughout the unit, students kept **reading logs** to record their thoughts and responses to the story.

During the seminar, students explored deeper themes of the book, discussing the contrast between the wisdom of nature and modern society. They reflected on the idea of “**Kin**,” a profound sense of connection and understanding toward people and nature, and considered how inner strength and the spiritual self can help us face life’s challenges.

📖 CFB Classes (Grades 5–8) – Chinese New Year Traditions

Across the CFB classes, students explored **Chinese New Year traditions and customs**. This integrated task strengthened language accuracy, critical thinking, teamwork, and digital literacy, all within a purposeful and engaging framework.

Dear Parents and Community,

Art 8 students are well underway with their candy-based acrylic paintings despite the challenges of holiday scheduling and school events. After using gridding techniques to accurately transfer their drawings onto canvas, students began building their paintings by identifying the highlights and shadows within their compositions. 

Grade 7

Students investigated gears and gear ratios, learning how to calculate them and analyze how different ratios influence speed and torque. Through a series of mini activities, they strengthened their grasp of gear mechanics and their real-world applications. To wrap up the unit, each group designed and built a robot specifically optimized for either speed or torque, putting their knowledge into practice through a fun, hands-on challenge. They tested their creations by measuring speed and assessing strength in push-and-pull weight trials, solidifying their understanding of mechanical advantage and performance optimization.



Grade 8

Students developed key engineering design cycle, planning, testing, and refining their ideas through hands-on experimentation. To build strong documentation habits, students also maintained detailed records of their progress and reflections, emphasizing the importance of organization and precision in engineering work. Their learning culminated in the exciting **Ring Leader Challenge**, where they first operated their robots using manual control before programming them to perform the task autonomously. This challenge allowed students to experience the contrast between driver-controlled and automated movements, deepening their understanding of robotic control systems while sharpening their teamwork and problem-solving skills.

Grade 5 & 6 Technology Update

Hello TCIS Community!

Our Technology classes have been busy developing important digital literacy and design skills over the past few weeks.

Grade 5 students have been focusing on **research skills**. They began by learning how to organize their ideas using **mind maps**, which help them break a large topic into smaller, manageable parts. Using their mind maps, students practiced generating **strong research questions** that guide their learning.

Once they had clear questions, students moved into the research phase using their technology tools to locate **reliable information sources online**. A key part of this process was learning how to **cite sources correctly** and understand why proper citation is important for avoiding plagiarism and giving credit to original authors.

Alongside their research work, Grade 5 students have continued building their **keyboard fluency**. Recent typing lessons have focused on **punctuation and advanced keys**, as well as **cross-curricular typing activities** that allow them to practice typing while working with content from other subjects.

Grade 6 students have been exploring the world of **graphic design**. They began by studying **typography**, learning how fonts and text styles can influence how a message is communicated. Students then applied these ideas in a **logo design project**, where they practiced creating simple, clear visual identities.

As part of this unit, students also learned about the difference between **vector and raster images**, two important types of digital graphics used in design. Understanding how these formats work helps students choose the right type of image depending on how it will be used.

Like Grade 5, Grade 6 students have also continued improving their **typing skills through Typing.com activities**, working at a more advanced level to strengthen accuracy, speed, and familiarity with additional keys.

It has been great to see students developing both **technical skills and creative thinking**, while also learning how technology supports research, communication, and design.



Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

The Thailand Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

- The **Personal Data Protection Act B.E. 2562 (2019) (PDPA)** was published on 27 May 2019 in Thailand's Government Gazette.
([English](#), [Thai](#))
- The PDPA is under the supervision of the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society and the main supervising authority of the PDPA is the Office of Data Protection Committee (Office).
- School is the "Data Controller" means a person or juristic person having decision-making on the collection, use, or disclosure of personal information (PDPA Section 6).

Personal Data	Sensitive Data
Any information relating to a natural person, which enables the identification of such person, whether directly or indirectly, but not including information of deceased persons.	Any personal data pertaining to: <ul style="list-style-type: none">● racial or ethnic origin● political opinions● religious or philosophical beliefs● sexual behavior● criminal records● health data, disability● trade union information● genetic data, biometric data, or any data which may affect the data subject in the same manner as to be prescribed by the PDPC.

In essence, the PDPA is designed to protect a data owner from the unauthorized or unlawful collection, use, or disclosure and processing of their personal data. As with Europe's GDPR, for example, websites will have to include simple and straightforward language, and receive clear consent from each user, before (or at the time of) collecting such data, using it in any way, or passing it along to third parties.

Another key aspect under the PDPA is the requirement to inform the data subject of (i) how their personal data will be used by the data controller, (ii) whether personal data will be disclosed to a third party, and (iii) of the data subject's rights to their personal data. This must be done at the time the personal data is being collected from the data subject.

The rights of data owners under the PDPA include the following:

- Right to be informed
- Right to access
- Right to data portability
- Right to object
- Right to erasure/ right to be forgotten
- Right to restrict of processing
- Right to rectify

Even foreign entities will need to follow the rules spelled out in the PDPA, as long as they deal with any activities that are related to the processing of personal data such as offering of goods and services or monitoring of users' online behavior, from users who are based in Thailand.

There are both criminal and civil liabilities for breaches of personal data privacy. For instance, the collection, use or disclosure of sensitive personal data illegally is liable to a fine of five million baht on conviction. Collection, use or disclosure of general personal data without a legal basis is liable to a three million baht fine on conviction, and failing to get consent from data's owner or refusing the data's owner access to their personal data is liable to a one million baht fine on conviction.

If the unauthorized use or disclosure of personal data causes damage to other people or subjects other people to hate, shame or contempt, violators may face six months in prison and/or a fine of 500,000 baht on conviction.

Nurse: School Health Services

The Nurse Clinic is a spacious and well staffed facility at TCIS that can accommodate several students at any given time of the day. The Nurse Clinic is open daily from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The clinic is located on the ground floor next to the storeroom and staffed by a registered nurse and one nurse's aid. The clinic treats all minor injuries occurring at school. The athletics program has a school nurse who works until the sports games finish.

The clinic stays in touch with the Ministry of Public Health to keep abreast of health notifications. Current vaccination information is sent out to parents for their information and written consent. Students in grade 1 thru grade 6 may get some vaccinations from our nurse according to the Thai Ministry of Public Health. Records of previous vaccinations are kept on file with the school nurse.

A worldwide, comprehensive (24-hour) accident insurance coverage is provided for all students up to 60,000 baht yearly.

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
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


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


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
