Dear TCIS Family,

As we reflect on the past month—including the Thanksgiving holiday celebrated last week - I would like to express my gratitude for our entire TCIS community. Thank you for your partnership, your support, and the trust you place in us each day. It has been an exciting and meaningful month across all divisions, filled with learning, leadership, and service.

#### Hand, Foot, and Mouth (HFM) Response

Last week, we met with the Ministry of Public Health (MOPH) for a consultation and review of our HFM procedures. The MOPH was pleased with our response and requested that we implement several additional preventative measures. Those recommendations have been

#### **IB Programme Update**

Over the next few weeks, we will be conducting Individual IB Meetings with parents of students who previously indicated interest in the IB Diploma Programme. These meetings are a valuable

opportunity to discuss programme pathways, course selections, and the ways the IB can challenge and support your child academically. #### Semester Exams: December 11-16

Semester Exams for secondary students will be held from December 11–16. Teachers will be providing exam schedules, review materials, and content outlines two weeks in advance, giving students ample time to prepare. Please encourage your child to review this information carefully and to reach out to their teachers with any questions.

#### **Tips for Effective Exam Preparation**

- Ask Questions Early: If anything is unclear, students should seek help before the night of the exam. Teachers are happy to clarify concepts or recommend resources.
- Create a Study Schedule: Break study time into manageable sessions over several days. Focusing on small goals each day helps prevent cramming and reduces stress.
- Review Class Notes Regularly: Encourage students to revisit lesson notes, assignments, and teacher-provided review sheets. Creating summaries or concept maps can support deeper understanding.
- Practice Active Recall: Testing oneself—through flashcards, practice problems, or self-quizzing—is one of the most effective study methods for long-term retention.
- Prepare Materials Ahead of Time: Students should check calculators, stationery, and exam requirements the day before each exam to avoid unnecessary stress.
- Prioritize Sleep and Wellness: A well-rested brain learns and recalls information far more effectively. Balanced meals, hydration, and regular breaks also make a significant difference.

#### **University Application Updates**

For Thai nationals, TCAS registration opened on October 28, allowing students to begin early and first-round applications to many Thai universities. Please remind your child to review deadlines carefully and consult with Kru Rung for support.

Many U.S. universities have deadlines approaching in December and January. Students should ensure their Common App is fully completed and meet with Mr. Shaun for assistance with the process.

In Taiwan, the first round for international applications and overseas Chinese applicants is ending soon, and the second round will begin in January and February. Students should consult with Mr. Tony for support.

#### University of British Columbia (UBC) Visit

A university representative from UBC recently visited and shared general information and admission requirements with our students. He kept it fun and engaging with some quiz questions about Canada. This year we have a few students applying to UBC and hope to see more next year, as they are globally ranked within the top 50 universities, and offer many exciting majors and opportunities.

#### **HS Course Catalog Meeting**

Ms. Jasmine and I recently delivered our annual presentation on proposed courses for next year. At this time, all G9-11 students are required to update their 4-Year Course Plans with their intentions for next year (Due Dec. 12). All G8 students will fill out their plan for the next four years of high school, indicating the courses they plan to take (Due Dec. 19). All assignments can be found in Google Classroom.

#### Doctor Follows Internship (Dec. 20-27, Bangkok)

Open to students aged 14–18 interested in medicine or healthcare. Gain hands-on <u>experience</u> shadowing real doctors in various specialties. Watch a short video here or contact Todd Cikraji directly at info@volunteerthailand.org.

#### Match by Concourse (November offers)

Our seniors received their third round of scholarship offers on November 22! We're proud of all our outstanding students who continue to earn recognition from universities. If a student has not yet received any offers, we encourage them to meet with Mr. Shaun to review and update their Match by Concourse profile to ensure the best results. University offers are direct and have firm deadlines—if students don't respond, offers will expire. Students should always select "Interested" to keep receiving updates.

#### **Class Updates**

#### Seniors (Grade 12)

Students should now be actively submitting their university applications and preparing for interviews, if required. Applications for Europe and Australia will begin to open soon, while other countries have deadlines quickly approaching.

#### Juniors (Grade 11)

Portfolio drafts were due November 24. Every student is expected to have one in the event a university requests it as part of the application process. Just like their resumes, these will continue to be updated throughout their junior and into their senior years. As a reminder, all G11 students are expected to take the SAT and IELTS exams at least once during their junior year. TCIS will host one last SAT exam in March, however students can register to test at other locations in May and June. IELTS is available every weekend at many locations around the greater Bangkok area.

#### Freshmen & Sophomores (Grades 9-10)

Students should continue exploring colleges and careers through Unifrog. Completing the Skills and Personality quizzes and starting a university longlist now will help them feel more confident and prepared as they move into their junior and senior years.

#### **Community Service (CS) Hours**

Throughout high school, students should be working to earn their **required** community service hours for graduation. We highly encourage students to come up with a plan and aim to earn at least a fourth of their required hours each year (starting in G9). Trying to make up most of your hours in your junior and senior year is extremely difficult and could prevent students from graduating.

- Class of 2026: 40 hours required for graduation
- Classes of 2027–2029: 60 hours required for graduation

As we approach the end of the semester, Grade 12 students are balancing university applications, upcoming exams, and important preparations for life after TCIS. This month, our focus is on mock interviews, application progress, and finishing the semester strong.

#### **Mock Interviews & Application Reflection**

Over the next few weeks, students will participate in mock interviews designed to build confidence and prepare them for university and scholarship conversations. These sessions also help students practice articulating their strengths, goals, and personal stories.

#### **College Application Progress**

Congratulations to the seniors who have already completed their applications—and especially to those who have started receiving acceptance offers from their dream schools. We're incredibly proud of your hard work.

For students still in the process: keep going, stay organized, and don't fall behind. University deadlines are approaching quickly, and every component—essays, portfolios, forms, and recommendations—needs careful attention. Please schedule time with Kru Rung, Mr. Tony, Ms. Jasmine, Mr. Shaun, or Dr. Michael if you need support reviewing your materials. We are all here to help.

#### **Semester Exams**

Semester Exams will be held December 11–16. Students should balance exam preparation with continued progress on applications. Managing time well now will reduce stress later and ensure a strong finish to the term.

In Senior Seminar, students will also complete a **mock application and reflection** task, encouraging them to evaluate their readiness, identify strengths, and recognize areas for improvement as they continue the application journey.

#### Stay Focused—Avoid Senioritis

With graduation on the horizon, motivation can start to dip, but this is an important period academically and personally. Mid-year grades, teacher feedback, and overall engagement still matter for university decisions. Stay committed, stay on schedule, and finish the semester with your best effort.

Dear Parents,

Happy (almost) December! We only have a few weeks left of school before Winter Break is upon us. Over the course of the next couple weeks, the students will be taking their Semester Exams. Even though we have a long break coming up, please make sure that the students remain focused on the work that we are doing here at school, as the exams are a very big part of their grades. I hope you all have a wonderful month of December and a happy end to 2025.

In **Modern World History**, we spent some time learning about the Renaissance and how it was a transformational period in world history. We have shifted our focus to learning about the Maritime Empires of Europe. The students have just finished with a presentation about an empire of their choice from the Spanish, Portuguese, British, and French empires. The next time period we will focus on is 1750-1900. I am really excited to see the awesome work they will do.

In **World Geography and Culture**, we are hard at work learning about the geography and culture of Africa. Over the past few weeks, we spent some time learning about the Scramble for Africa and the consequences of haphazard European colonization. The students are currently finishing up on a presentation about African Tribal Nations. One of the things that people don't realize is that most African nations contain a multitude of different ethnic groups within a single country. I think this unit has been truly eye opening for many students. I know they will do a great job on their African Tribal Nations Presentations. In Quarter 3, we will focus on the geography and culture of Europe.

In AP Human Geography, we have just finished our third unit, which was all about culture. We are currently getting into our fourth unit, which is all about political geography. Some of the things we will cover are the concepts of sovereignty, devolution, and political boundaries (both land and maritime). We also discuss some aspects of the American political system like redistricting and gerrymandering, which is something the students always find interesting. In addition to this, we discuss different forms of government around the world. This unit is very relevant to current events, so I think the students will enjoy it and I know they will do really well.

In **Foundations of Social Studies**, we are into our fourth unit, which is all about people and places. The students are learning about things like population density and distribution while building their English vocabulary related to social studies. Our next unit is "Government and Citizenship", where we will learn about different forms of government and how they operate.




In **Advanced Business**, students took on the role of media managers by producing storytelling videos that explored how a product can influence a nation's soft power and economy. Some of the submissions were truly outstanding. Many students pushed through the challenges of editing, developing both technical skill and creative confidence along the way.

In **AP Comparative Government**, students encountered their first full exam style essays. While the learning curve was clear, this early experience will help them build the analytical and structural skills needed for success throughout the year. Their growth is already evident.

In **Psychology**, students designed original research studies on bias. Each student developed a thesis, created an experiment, and collected data to evaluate their claims. Many explored the beauty premium and uncovered compelling results that helped deepen their understanding of cognitive and social bias.

After an unforgettable adventure through Japan for Week Without Walls, we are back and ready to finish the semester strong!

In **College Prep**, students complete personal statements tailored to their intended college majors for their portfolios. They participated in an interacting peer feedback session using the desk whiteboards and dry-erase markers, helping them revise with clarity and confidence.

In American Lit, students just finished reading *The Great Gatsby* and strengthening their vocabularies through great words pulled from the novel. As one of the culminating projects, students will analyze Fitzerald's use of color symbolism—echoing his goal of crafting "something intricately detailed"—to deepen their understanding of theme and style.

In **AP Seminar**, students finalized their Mock Individual Research Reports and are shifting into collaborative mode as they plan their Team Multimedia Presentations. These TMPs will serve as their Semester 1 exam and be performed live for an authentic assessment experience.

In **AP Lang**, after presenting rhetorical analyses of Disney songs, students began digging into AP-style multiple-choice questions. They are analyzing different question types, identifying the trickiest patterns, and working in groups to debate and defend answer choices—a process that builds both accuracy and rhetorical reasoning skills.




- 1. Pre-Write: Coming up with ideas and planning writing.
- 2. **Draft:** Writing the full text the first time.
- 3. **Revise**: Adding, taking away, or rearranging parts of the text and vocabulary.
- 4. Edit: Checking for capital letters, grammar, punctuation, and spelling.

Once they finished these steps, they typed their stories and added pictures to help bring them to life. As an added skill, they learned how to read a rubric to understand the feedback and grade earned. In the future, they should be consulting these rubrics to effectively complete the tasks.





Recently in High School Spanish, students stepped into the spotlight with an engaging role-play activity: *interviewing a celebrity*—in Spanish! After learning and practicing the verb ser and a full set of **descriptive adjectives**, students created interviews where they imagined meeting one of their favorite stars. In their scripts, they wrote both the questions and the celebrity's responses, focusing on using

vocabulary accurately and creatively.

A major goal of the activity was mastering adjective agreement—making sure descriptive words change to match the gender and number of the nouns they describe. Students did an excellent job applying what we've learned in class, using phrases like Ella es talentosa, Él es simpático, or Son muy trabajadores to describe their chosen celebrities clearly and correctly.

During the role-play, our classroom seemed to transform into a lively talk-show set. Students spoke with confidence, asked thoughtful questions, and brought their interviews to life with expressive delivery and strong communication skills. It's great to see their personalities shine as they practice and use real-world conversational Spanish.

#### **Math Department**

#### Mr. Matt



Dear Parents,

**Geometry/Algebra II:** Students explored triangle centers, including medians, altitudes, and bisectors. They practiced constructions and reviewed coordinate plane applications, such as identifying the centroid and orthocenter. Students also reviewed triangle inequalities and used algebra to solve related problems. After that, they studied proportions, similar triangles, and triangle proofs.

**Geometry:** Over the past few weeks, students explored parallel lines, transversals, and special angle pairs. They used algebra to analyze relationships and prove when lines were parallel. We also reviewed slope and wrote equations of lines in different forms.

**Foundations of Mathematics:**Students learned how to solve absolute value equations and explored the steps involved in solving multi-variable (literal) equations. Finally, they reviewed all types of equations covered in the unit to reinforce their understanding and prepare for assessments.

**Algebra II**:Students explored a variety of polynomial concepts. They reviewed exponent rules, learned to classify and simplify polynomial expressions, and practiced factoring using multiple strategies. They also worked on graphing polynomial functions, identifying roots and multiplicity, and solving equations through factoring. Lastly, they practiced dividing polynomials, applied the Remainder Theorem, and explored operations and composition of functions.







#### Ms. Shauna



Dear Parents,

This month's newsletter focus is on AP Calculus AB and AP Computer Science A. Students have now nearly completed their study of differential calculus, with recent efforts centered on an important set of skills called curve sketching—using derivatives to understand the key features and behavior of functions. They have also worked through optimization problems, which show how calculus can be applied to real scientific, economic, and everyday situations.

Our next major topic marks a brand-new shift in perspective: the antiderivative. For the past few months, students have learned how to analyze how functions

change; now they will begin exploring the reverse process. Over the next two months, we will investigate techniques for evaluating indefinite and definite integrals, solving differential equations, and applying integration to meaningful, real-world problems.

In AP Computer Science A, students have continued to build a solid foundation in fundamental programming concepts. Recent learning has focused on control structures and iterative processes, including the use of if/else if/else statements and various loop structures such as for loops, nested for loops, and while loops. Although keeping track of variable changes across multiple iterations can be demanding, students have demonstrated strong progress and perseverance in mastering these skills.

The course will now transition to a key component of Java programming: object-oriented design. Students will begin writing their own classes from the ground up, incorporating instance variables, methods, constructors, and appropriate getter and setter methods. This unit represents an important step in preparing students for more complex programming tasks and future project-based work.
















Dear Parents,

I hope everyone enjoyed the Week Without Walls trip; I've heard great feedback from the students! This month in the high school math department, we've covered a lot of great topics!

In Pre-Calculus, students have wrapped up a unit on exponential and logarithmic functions/equations. We had an exam covering these topics prior to the Week Without Walls trip. We've currently dove into Trigonometry and will be

continuing this unit through the rest of quarter 2 and also quarter 3! Students have learned about the unit circle and are currently applying these trig concepts without the use of technology. Our second exam of quarter 2 will be a non-calculator exam so I encourage students to practice as much as possible. We will then begin learning about radians and will end the quarter with a project on graphing sinusoidal functions as well as preparing for our big semester exam coming up during the second and third week of December!

In AP Calculus BC, students have completed the first 6 units of the curriculum including some advanced integration techniques that are a part of the BC curriculum. Our unit 6 exam will be the last week of November, and we will move onto Unit 7 - Slope Fields and Differential Equations. Students will have a semester exam that will look similar in nature to an AP Calculus AB exam. After the break, we will begin unit 8 - Area/Volume of Solids and spend the months of January/February doing the last two BC units.

In Calculus, students have finished learning about the applications of derivatives and function analysis including increasing/decreasing functions and concavity. We had a test covering these topics before the Week Without Walls trip. Our next major assessment will be a presentation during the last week of November where students will have to present an optimization problem to the class that is randomly assigned to them. Students will also prepare for the big semester exam coming up during the last two weeks of December. I encourage them to take the practice test as many times as possible to be best prepared!

#### Intro to Robotics

Intro to Robotics students were introduced to while loops and sensor-based movements using their VEX V5 Clawbots. Through hands-on coding activities, they learned how to make their robots repeat actions until specific conditions are met, such as a bumper being pressed. By combining loops with real-time sensor feedback, students began to understand how robots make autonomous decisions and respond to their environment. This foundational concept prepares them for more advanced programming and problem-solving challenges in future projects.










#### **Advanced Robotics**

Dear Parents,

We are now approaching the end of the second quarter, which also marks the end of the first semester. With semester exams scheduled for the 11th, 12th, 15th, and 16th of December, this is an important time for students to begin reviewing consistently. A little bit of study each school night can make a strong difference in both confidence and performance. Parents can help by encouraging students to pace their review and check in on what they have covered so far. As a reminder, the semester exam is worth 20 % of the entire semester, so preparation is essential.

In Chemistry, we have moved into one of the most exciting parts of the course. Students have begun exploring the world of quantum particles and the behavior of electrons. We have discussed how electrons occupy orbitals around the nucleus and how changes in their energy levels can produce visible light, heat, and other forms of energy. This unit often changes how students think about matter, and it has been wonderful to see their curiosity grow as we introduce these abstract but fascinating ideas.

In AP Chemistry, we are making steady progress and are almost halfway through the course content. The end of November brought the completion of Unit 4, and by the close of December we expect to be well over the midpoint of the curriculum. Students recently co-created and answered each other's lingering questions for Unit 3, which is the largest and most complex unit in the course. They put forth a strong effort on their test, and their continued teamwork is helping to reinforce their understanding. If all goes well, we should be ready for another laboratory experience soon.

In Health Science, we have wrapped up our unit on physical health and begun exploring mental health. Students have discussed what it means to have good character and are now thinking more deeply about values, empathy, and the ways people cope with challenges through defense mechanisms. We will likely complete this portion of the course by examining stress and strategies for managing it effectively. These conversations are meaningful, and we hope this understanding will support students both in class and in their daily lives.

#### Mr. Severino



Dear Parents,

As we move into the final stretch of the first semester, students have been engaging deeply with important mathematical and scientific ideas that build both academic readiness and real-world problem-solving skills. Below is an overview of what each class has been learning this month and why these topics matter beyond the classroom.

AP Precalculus: In November, students explored how exponential and

logarithmic functions model real-world patterns of growth and decay. They examined problems such as population growth, the intensity of sound, and concentration of solutions. Understanding exponential relationships is important in interpreting data such as viral spread, reading decibel levels on a sound meter. Logarithms help us scale large numbers and make sense of quantities that grow very quickly. Mastery of these functions builds analytical skills needed in higher-level math, science, economics, and technology.

**Physics:** Physics students focused on dynamics, the study of forces and why objects move the way they do. They explored Newton's Laws of Motion, friction, tension, normal force, and applied these concepts to real-life scenarios such as car safety, sports performance, and motion on inclines. A strong grasp of forces gives students practical insight into the world around them and builds the foundation for more advanced scientific learning.


**AP Physics 1:** Students learned how forces cause energy to transfer or transform, and how power describes the rate at which work is done. Students applied these concepts to real scenarios such as work done in lifting objects and how friction force does work on moving objects. Understanding how work is done in various situations can help students to improve the efficiency of systems by analysing how energy is transferred during operation of the system. The concepts involved form important foundation for future physics courses.

AP Physics 2: Students developed conceptual and quantitative understanding of magnetic fields, electromagnetic induction, the motor effect, and technological applications such as generators, motors, and transformers. By understanding how magnetic fields and electric currents interact, students gain insight into how the world's energy and communication systems function. Electromagnetism is at the core of modern life, from electronics to electricity, electromagnetism plays a central role.

**Algebra 1:** Algebra 1 students practiced solving systems of linear equations using graphing, substitution, and elimination. They learned to interpret solutions within various real-life contexts such as budgeting, chemical reactions, fitness and exercises, and determining break-even points. Students solved systems of equations involving real life situations with multiple problems. The skills developed strengthened logical reasoning and practical decision-making - abilities students will use for years to come.













Dear Parents,

Last week, our Biology students stepped out of the classroom and onto the ground for a fun and energetic Biology activity! As part of understanding the concept of **aerobic and anaerobic respiration**, students measured their **breathing rate** at rest and after different types of exercise.

From **jumping**, **jogging**, **sit-ups**, **push-ups**, **to ball netting**, the students enjoyed a variety of movement-based tasks. They worked in pairs, taking turns to perform the exercise while their partner carefully counted their breaths — turning the lesson into a **collaborative**, **hands-on learning experience**.

#### What Did Students Learn?

Through this activity, students discovered firsthand how the body responds to physical activity. They observed how breathing rate increases to supply more oxygen to muscles during exercise — a key requirement of **aerobic respiration**. They also understood why the body sometimes switches to **anaerobic respiration** when oxygen becomes limited during intense activity.

This practical session helped students connect theory with real-life body responses. They not only learned why breathing rate changes, but also felt the science in action! Such experiential learning deepens understanding, builds curiosity, and makes Biology meaningful and fun.

#### ART 1

Art 1 students are just finishing up the last of their lino block prints. Students did a fantastic job during this unit. They learned about insect anatomy, blade safety and looked at the art of several printmakers. Students were taught how to safely navigate their lino cutters and blades into order to create strong prints that played with negative and positive space. Once students were done carving their lino blocks, we moved into the printmaking room where students experimented with color theory and blending inks inorder to create truly unique prints from each of their lino blocks. Students will be required to photograph their finished work and cut mats for an exhibition which we plan to launch on December 9th.

HS Art student safety is always a priority in class. In addition to learning proper carving techniques, students were taught proper blade disposal and used water based inks that do not require solvents. These inks are better for our learners and our planet. We would like to thank the TCIS administration for their continued support of the HS Art program with the purchase of these items which provide a comprehensive art education without negatively impacting our world.

## **ADVANCED ART**

Advanced Art students are just finishing up their figure drawing unit. Students learned correct body measurements and proportions and were shown examples of the human figure in art history through the ages to help them better understand how this genre has evolved over time.


To render their imagery, students created a large still life using skeletons from the science department and items from the high school still life cupboard. They were challenged to find compositions that were both balanced and dynamic. After measuring and cutting their paper, students applied a reverse grisaille technique before shading their objects with hard and soft chalk pastels, wood-cased pastels, and tinted charcoals. These rich mediums



offer a wide range of colors and application methods, each requiring different pressures and blending techniques. Most importantly, students made valuable discoveries about their personal artistic preferences as they worked and developed a deeper understanding of their materials.

Students will frame their work and are scheduled to exhibit their pieces on December 12th. Here are some of their finished artworks.







## **INTRO PAINTING**

Intro Painting students have been working hard on their large-scale still life canvases. Throughout this unit, students reviewed light effects and reflective light, worked on creating contrasting backgrounds, explored color relationships, and experimented with texture. Once they add their final touches, students will write a reflection and display their paintings—first on the 6th floor of the MS Building, and later on the 3rd floor of Building 3. For their final mini project of the year, students will choose between rendering disco balls or metallic bows.

## **DIGITAL ART**

Digital Art students have been laying the groundwork for their Charity Box Unit through research and skill-building activities. To begin, students explored a range of charitable organizations and examined existing charity box designs to better understand current trends and effective visual communication. This year, they chose once again to support PAWS Bangkok, our long-standing partner and a valued local cat shelter.

Before diving into their own charity box designs, students spent time practicing on our WACOM Cintiq tablets. These professional-grade devices allow artists to draw directly on the tablets with a natural hand to paper feel while working with design software such as Adobe Illustrator. Our Cintiq 16 tablets, equipped with over 8,000 levels of pressure sensitivity, respond precisely to the artist's touch, making digital drawing closely resemble traditional techniques. Mastering these tools is an essential step in preparing students for a technology driven creative world.

To build confidence with digital drawing, students followed a panda illustration tutorial. This exercise not only introduced key tablet skills but also supported their upcoming work in creating designs for an animal focused charity. We hope you enjoy listening and appreciate the wonderful performances our students have prepared.










Dear Parents,

#### Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

#### The Thailand Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

- The Personal Data Protection Act B.E. 2562 (2019) (PDPA) was published on 27 May 2019 in Thailand's Government Gazette.
  - (English, Thai)
- The PDPA is under the supervision of the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society and the main supervising authority of the PDPA is the Office of Data Protection Committee (Office).
- School is the "Data Controller" means a person or juristic person having decision-making on the collection, use, or disclosure of personal information (PDPA Section 6).

Personal Data	Sensitive Data
Any information relating to a natural person, which enables the identification of such person, whether directly or indirectly, but not including information of deceased persons.	Any personal data pertaining to: <ul> <li>racial or ethnic origin</li> <li>political opinions</li> <li>religious or philosophical beliefs</li> <li>sexual behavior</li> <li>criminal records</li> <li>health data, disability</li> <li>trade union information</li> <li>genetic data, biometric data, or any data which may affect the data subject in the same manner as to be prescribed by the PDPC.</li> </ul>

In essence, the PDPA is designed to protect a data owner from the unauthorized or unlawful collection, use, or disclosure and processing of their personal data. As with Europe's GDPR, for example, websites will have to include simple and straightforward language, and receive clear consent from each user, before (or at the time of) collecting such data, using it in any way, or passing it along to third parties.

Another key aspect under the PDPA is the requirement to inform the data subject of (i) how their personal data will be used by the data controller, (ii) whether personal data will be disclosed to a third party, and (iii) of the data subject's rights to their personal data. This must be done at the time the personal data is being collected from the data subject.

The rights of data owners under the PDPA include the following:

- Right to be informed
- Right to access
- Right to data portability
- Right to object
- Right to erasure/ right to be forgotten
- Right to restrict of processing
- Right to rectify

Even foreign entities will need to follow the rules spelled out in the PDPA, as long as they deal with any activities that are related to the processing of personal data such as offering of goods and services or monitoring of users' online behavior, from users who are based in Thailand.

There are both criminal and civil liabilities for breaches of personal data privacy. For instance, the collection, use or disclosure of sensitive personal data illegally is liable to a fine of five million baht on conviction. Collection, use or

disclosure of general personal data without a legal basis is liable to a three million baht fine on conviction, and failing to get consent from data's owner or refusing the data's owner access to their personal data is liable to a one million baht fine on conviction.

If the unauthorized use or disclosure of personal data causes damage to other people or subjects other people to hate, shame or contempt, violators may face six months in prison and/or a fine of 500,000 baht on conviction.

#### **Nurse: School Health Services**

The Nurse Clinic is a spacious and well staffed facility at TCIS that can accommodate several students at any given time of the day. The Nurse Clinic is open daily from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The clinic is located on the ground floor next to the storeroom and staffed by a registered nurse and one nurse's aid. The clinic treats all minor injuries occurring at school. The athletics program has a school nurse who works until the sports games finish.

The clinic stays in touch with the Ministry of Public Health to keep abreast of health notifications. Current vaccination information is sent out to parents for their information and written consent. Students in grade 1 thru grade 6 may get some vaccinations from our nurse according to the Thai Ministry of Public Health. Records of previous vaccinations are kept on file with the school nurse.

A worldwide, comprehensive (24-hour) accident insurance coverage is provided for all students up to 60,000 baht yearly.
