





Dear TCIS Family,

We are almost halfway through Quarter 2, and this is an important time for students to stay focused and maintain strong academic habits. As we move into the latter half of the quarter, please remind students to use their planners and regularly check Google Classroom and PowerSchool for updates. Teachers are available for extra support, and students are encouraged to take advantage of these opportunities.

The Week Without Walls (WWW) program is just around the corner. This special week allows students to engage in learning experiences beyond their regular classes. For students in Grades 5–12 who will not be traveling, students will complete an Interdisciplinary Project that will take place at home. This at-home project will encourage students to apply design thinking, research, and creativity to real-world challenges. It will culminate in a final presentation that showcases their ideas and solutions. This assignment will be scored as a Major Assessment for all students not traveling for WWW, so encourage your student to submit their best work.

The IB Diploma Programme (IBDP) continues to be an exciting pathway for our upper school students. We recently held our <u>IB Information Meeting</u> for Parents on Friday, October 24, followed by a Student Information Session on Thursday, October 30. These sessions provided insights into the structure of the programme, course selections, and the academic and personal growth opportunities it offers.

Parents of interested Grade 9 and 10 students are invited to schedule an individual planning meeting with the IB Coordinator and the Counseling Team. These meetings will take place from November 17 to December 12 and are designed to help families understand course options, workload balance, and the expectations of the IBDP. At this point in the semester, your support at home continues to make a great impact. Take time to review upcoming deadlines with your child, discuss time management strategies, and encourage a healthy balance between academics, extracurriculars, and rest. Asking students to share what they are learning is a simple but effective way to reinforce understanding and confidence.

University Application Updates

The first round of international applications is now open for several top universities in Taiwan and Hong Kong, with most deadlines falling in mid-November. Students are encouraged to check university websites for exact dates and consult with Mr. Tony for guidance.

For Thai nationals, TCAS registration opened on October 28, allowing students to begin early and first-round applications to many Thai universities. Please remind your child to review deadlines carefully and consult with Kru Rung for support.

Many U.S. universities also have Early Action deadlines on November 1 and November 15. Students planning to apply early should ensure their Common App is fully completed and meet with Mr. Shaun for assistance with the process.

PSAT and SAT Preparation

Students in Grades 8–10 recently completed the PSAT, a yearly practice exam designed to help them become familiar with the format and experience of the actual SAT. By Grade 11, all students are expected to take both the SAT and IELTS at least once in preparation for university applications.

NUS Admission & Faculty E-event

The National University of Singapore (NUS) will host an online information session on November 15. This event is a great opportunity for students and parents to learn more about admission requirements and hear directly from various academic programs. Event details and registration information have been shared in the G10, G11, and G12 Google Classrooms.

Doctor Follows Internship (Dec. 20-27, Bangkok)

Open to students aged 14–18 interested in medicine or healthcare. Gain hands-on <u>experience</u> shadowing real doctors in various specialties. Watch a short video here or contact Todd Cikraji directly at info@volunteerthailand.org.

Match by Concourse (October offers)

Our seniors received their second round of scholarship offers on October 22! We're proud of all our outstanding students who continue to earn recognition from universities. If a student has not yet received any offers, we encourage them to meet with Mr. Shaun to review and update their Match by Concourse profile to ensure the best results.

A quick reminder for students and families: University offers are direct and have firm deadlines—if students don't respond, offers will expire. Students should always select "Interested" to keep receiving updates.

Class Updates

Seniors (Grade 12)

Students should now be actively preparing and submitting their university applications. Please see the information above for key deadlines and resources.

Juniors (Grade 11)

Most students have made great progress on their resumes, which will be important for college applications next year. Resumes can continue to be updated throughout the year. The next assignment—Portfolios—is due on November 28.

Freshmen & Sophomores (Grades 9–10)

Students should continue exploring colleges and careers through Unifrog. Completing the Skills and Personality quizzes

and starting a university longlist now will help them feel more confident and prepared as they move into their junior and senior years.

Community Service (CS) Hours

Throughout high school, students should be working to earn their **required** community service hours for graduation. We highly encourage students to come up with a plan and aim to earn at least a fourth of their required hours each year (starting in G9). Trying to make up most of your hours in your junior and senior year is extremely difficult and could prevent students from graduating.

- Class of 2026: 40 hours required for graduation
- Classes of 2027–2029: 60 hours required for graduation

THAILAND

- Portfolios are expected for all Thai universities.
- Double-check university websites for deadlines. Some first rounds have already passed.
- Collect, scan, and organize the necessary documents to make it easier to locate and send (personal docs like your passport and house registration, certificate of enrollment and transcript from TCIS, SAT and IELTS score reports at C.)
- TCAS opens at the end of October. You will also need the above information to upload for TCAS
- Use your personal email (not TCIS) when applying and check it frequently.
- Contact Kru Rung with questions

TAIWAN

- NTU and NTHU deadline November 16 (international applicants). This deadline must be met for scholarship apportunities.
- NTU and NTHU interviews December 20 and 21
- Use your personal email (not TCIS) when applying and check it frequently.
- Contact Mr. Tony with questions.

AMERICA

- Early Action (EA) deadlines November 1 and 15. Meeting this deadline greatly increases scholarship opportunities.
- Complete your Common App requirements before EA deadlines.
- Remember to choose your Teacher Recommenders from Unifrog and email Mr. Shaun. He will follow up with the teacher.
- Use your personal email (not TCIS) when applying and check it frequently.
- . Contact Mr. Shaun with questions.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Our AP Research students are entering an exciting stage in their projects—collecting data. Over the next few weeks, students will begin sending out surveys or planning and conducting experiments as part of their individual research studies.

Students who are using surveys are developing well-designed questions to gather opinions, experiences, or behaviors from a specific group of people. Before surveys can be shared, students must receive approval to ensure their questions are ethical, respectful, and aligned with their research goals. Once approved, they will distribute their surveys, often through email or online forms, and begin collecting responses.

Students conducting experiments are currently in the planning stage, deciding on materials, variables, and procedures. They must carefully design their experiments so they can collect data fairly and consistently. Before beginning, they will also submit their experimental plans for teacher and AP Research coordinator approval to ensure safety and ethical standards are met.

After data collection, students will analyze their results to look for patterns and meaning. This analysis will form the foundation of their academic paper and presentation later in the year.

Parents can support their students by asking about their research question and how they plan to collect data, encouraging them to stay organized since data collection can take time, and reminding them to check for responses regularly and record everything accurately.

This stage is one of the most hands-on parts of the AP Research process, and students are learning valuable skills in project management, communication, and ethical research. Thank you for your continued support as our students bring their original research ideas to life.

Dear Parents,

Happy November! I hope that you all had a fantastic month of October and a wonderful October Break. With the start of a new quarter and Week Without Walls, this is always an exciting time of the year with so much going on. While the first quarter has a lot of introductory activities and takes a bit of time to get into the routines of school once again, the second and third quarters are really where the bulk of the work gets done. Because of this, please make sure that the students are coming to class every day well-rested and ready to work hard and

learn. I am excited to see all of the learning inside (and outside) of the classroom this month.

In **Modern World History**, we are shifting our focus to the time period of 1450-1750. This time period sees an age of expanding empires. Some of these empires are land-based, like the Mughal Empire and the Ottoman Empire while others are maritime empires, like the British, Spanish, and Portuguese Empires. This is a time period of great discovery and cultural change. We began with a focus on the Medieval Europe and the Middle Ages and will then shift our focus to the Renaissance. I am really exited to see the students broaden their understanding of the world we live in through the study of history.

In **World Geography and Culture**, we are beginning our new unit on the continent of Africa. The students are hard at work reviewing all of the countries of Africa in preparation for the test at the end of the quarter. Some of the areas of focus during this unit will be imperialism and the Scramble for Africa, Apartheid in South Africa, ethnic conflict in Rwanda, and African Tribal nations. I know that the students are excited to learn about an area of the world they are not very familiar with.

In **AP Human Geography**, we are into our third unit, which is all about culture. During this unit, the students are learning about diffusion, which is the process by which culture spreads. This is a very broad unit that focuses on a lot of complex topics like language, religion, race, and ethnicity. Overall, the students have done a great job so far and seem to be very engaged with the content of the course, which is great. Over the next few weeks, the pace and rigor of the class will increase as we introduce new concepts. As long as the students are working hard, I know they will do a great job!

In **Foundations of Social Studies**, we are into our third unit, which is all about culture and identity. The students are exploring all of the components that make up culture and building their English vocabulary related to social studies. Our next unit is "people and places", where we will learn about population, migration, and how people in different places live.

In **AP Microeconomics**, students completed their first major assessment, covering Units 1–3. The overall results were fantastic, and it's been rewarding to see such strong engagement with complex economic theory and application.

In **Advanced Business**, students wrapped up their month-long *Build a Business* project, where they developed, designed, and pitched original products. The final roundtable presentations were a highlight! Each student had multiple opportunities to speak, collaborate, and practice the art of persuasive pitching. The ideas were creative, the energy was high, and a few products even sparked real entrepreneurial potential! Below you'll see some of the most popular concepts from this round.

In **AP Comparative Government**, students are tackling the most demanding unit of the course; Unit 2, a deep dive into political systems and institutions. With their upcoming exam covering both Units 1 and 2, the two most challenging parts of the course, I'm confident they'll rise to the occasion. Their discussions have shown great insight and curiosity about how governments function around the world.

In **Business Economics**, students are moving into the core principles of the subject; supply and demand, business cycles, and market behavior. The first test of the year is coming up, and many students are already showing genuine enthusiasm for understanding how these economic forces shape the real world.

In **Psychology**, students are transforming into young researchers. After forming their own hypotheses and designing studies through surveys or observations, they are now preparing reports to present their findings. It's been wonderful to see how seriously they've taken the process of inquiry and experimentation.

As we head toward Week Without Walls, I'm excited to see students continue applying their learning beyond the classroom. Their curiosity, teamwork, and creativity have made this term both productive and inspiring.

In **AP Seminar**, students kicked off the mock Performance Task 1 by sharing personal interests regarding global issues in order to form groups, discussing teamwork and collaboration within their new groups, and focusing on understanding their chosen topic through scholarly articles.







Dear Parents,

These past few weeks have been quite busy for both French and Creative Writing students! Here's a quick look of what we did and are doing right now.

French Elective: Students wrapped up chapter 2 of the Bien-dit! book by doing a short presentation of basic French introductions and survival vocabulary. We have now started chapter 3 which will get students acquainted with physical traits and

characteristics as well as family members. This will lead them to a project of presenting a family tree in class. Students will be creating a visual family tree project that combines art and French language skills! They'll design a family tree (drawn or with photos) that labels family members using French possessive adjectives and relationship vocabulary (ma mère, mon père, etc.). Additionally, they'll write an 8-sentence paragraph in French describing one family member in detail. The paragraph must include the person's age (using the correct French verb), three physical descriptions, three personality traits (with proper adjective agreement—a key grammar skill in French), three activities the person enjoys, and three things they dislike. This project helps students practice family vocabulary, possessive adjectives, and the challenging concept of adjective-noun agreement in French, all while creating something personal and meaningful. A detailed rubric is available in Google Classroom to guide their work. This is a wonderful opportunity for your student to share their family while building confidence in written and descriptive French!. All of it, *en français*! As always, to have an idea of the lessons and activities done in class, I strongly suggest parents to consult Google Classroom on a regular basis as everything we do (along with the feedback on all activities done) is available there.

Creative Writing: We finished the first quarter by writing a 100-word memoir (you can see examples below) and are now well on our way to master short stories. Students are currently working on an exciting project that puts them in the teacher's role! Each student will select one short story genre (Fantasy, Adventure, Gothic Horror, Modified Fairy Tale, Realistic Fiction, or Science Fiction) and teach the class about it. They'll present instructional slides, share a short story example they've selected, and lead a literary analysis discussion using terms like plot structure, characterization, and theme. After all presentations, the class will vote on their favorite story to use for an upcoming test. Finally, students will apply what they've learned by writing two original short stories in different genres. This project develops public speaking skills, deepens literary understanding, and encourages peer-to-peer learning. Presentations are graded on content knowledge, use of literary terminology, and presentation skills. Students are encouraged to practice at home—feel free to be their test audience! You can consult their work as well as the feedback provided by checking Google Classroom on a regular basis!

Math Department

Dear Parents,

Geometry/Algebra II: In this unit, students explored the different centers of triangles. They learned about triangle midsegments, perpendicular and angle bisectors, and reviewed the Pythagorean Theorem while studying the circumcenter and incenter. Later, they examined medians, centroids, altitudes, and the orthocenter

Geometry: In this unit, students explored relationships involving parallel lines, transversals, and angle pairs. They practiced identifying angle relationships, used algebra to solve problems, and worked on proving lines are parallel. Additionally as a cross divisional learning opportunity this class visited Grade 1 & Grade 2's Diorama Day (see photos below).

Foundations of Mathematics: Students practiced solving multi-step equations and worked with variables on both sides. They also explored what it means for an equation to have no solution or infinite solutions. Lastly, they applied their skills to solve algebraic proportions. These topics built a strong foundation for equation reasoning and problem solving.

Algebra II: In this upcoming unit, students will focus on mastering polynomials. They will review exponent rules, learn how to classify polynomials, and practice operations with them. We will also explore several methods of factoring, including GCF, difference of squares and cubes, trinomials, and four-term polynomials. These skills will help build a strong foundation for future algebraic problem solving.

Dear Parents,

In our Algebra classes students have demonstrated their understanding of exponent rules and scientific notation, and we've moved to a study on linear equations, and soon systems of linear equations. It should be familiar to some extent but we will be progressing to uncharted territory shortly.

In Computer Coding class, students have been gently learning about classes, constructors and methods in creating new shape objects on the canvas. For example, Circle circ = new Circle(50) where Circle is the class, circ is the variable name, and new Circle is calling the constructor with radius 50.

In AP Computer Science, students have wrapped up approximately half of their course, most recently learning about control structures and looping in Java, culminating in a Collegeboard lab in which they create a chatbot and a written summative.

In AP Calculus AB students are also approximately halfway through and have most recently learned about related rates, local linearity and L'Hopital's Rule. They are well on track!

Take a look at what we've done this month in our high school math classes:

AP Calculus BC:

Students have completed the first 5/10 units from the BC curriculum and have dove into unit 6 (integration). We've worked on antidifferentiation, Riemann sums, the trapezoidal rule, as well as definite and indefinite integration. We will wrap up unit 6 in the month of November!

Calculus:

Students have just completed a unit on implicit differentiation and related rates. We will begin learning about function analysis and concavity in the month of November. The first major assessment will be right before students set-off for Week Without Walls!

Pre-Calculus:

Students have just completed a unit on logarithmic properties and graphs of exponential/logarithmic functions. We will begin our next topic on exponential and logarithmic equations and students will have their first major assessment on these topics right before they set-off for Week Without Walls!

Intro to Robotics:

Students enhanced their programming skills by learning to use functions and variables in C++, including defining and calling functions for the arm and claw to move. They practiced writing function definitions with parameters to make their code more flexible and efficient. They applied these concepts in the Labyrinth Treasure Challenge, where they pseudocoded their solution, mapped the maze, and programmed their robots to pick up and deliver a "treasure" to the end goal. These activities combined planning, problem-solving, and precise coding key skills in robotics engineering.











Advanced Robotics:

Our **Cyber Wolves** teams have demonstrated great progress over the past few weeks as they finalized their intake builds and systematically documented their work in their engineering notebooks. Each team completed a detailed reflection outlining their design rationale, explaining the choices behind materials, shape, and motor configurations, as well as the challenges encountered during the building and testing phases. Their testing results provided valuable insights into what worked effectively and what required refinement. Teams also recorded the modifications made to enhance performance and reflected on their collaboration and teamwork throughout the process. After completing and fine-tuning their intakes, they shifted focus to outtake systems, carefully strategizing sensor placement and developing code to achieve optimal scoring performance. Pneumatics were integrated where necessary to improve other mechanisms, resulting in fully functional robots now being tested on the field for competition readiness. Meanwhile, the

coding teams continued to test and refine control programs, ensuring smooth and efficient operation of the robots for maximum scoring potential.


October has been a lively and eventful month. Between our week-long break, and Sports Day, students have had many opportunities to connect with one another and the school community. As we look ahead, excitement is building for the upcoming Week Without Walls trip, and I look forward to spending time with the grade 9 and 10 students in Vietnam. It has been rewarding to see how students are balancing academic focus with these important school experiences.

In Chemistry, we have just completed a laboratory experiment on phase changes and intermolecular forces. This activity helped students connect theoretical concepts to observable phenomena in the lab. We are now beginning one of the core topics of high school chemistry: the study of the atom. Students will examine atomic structure and gain an introduction to the principles of quantum physics, which describe how electrons behave inside atoms. This unit marks an important step in understanding how matter works at its most fundamental level.

In AP Chemistry, students have completed the third and longest unit of the course and are now applying their knowledge in a hands-on laboratory project. They are analyzing a substance of unknown concentration while determining the most effective methods for collecting and interpreting their data. This lab emphasizes not only technical accuracy but also scientific reasoning, helping students refine their approach to experimental chemistry as they continue through the course.


In Health Science, we have completed our discussions on total health and the major components of physical health. After exploring nutrition and evaluating different types of diets, students are now focusing on exercise and weight management. These lessons help students better understand how physical activity contributes to overall well-being. The topic also serves as a bridge into our next unit on mental health, where students will learn about the connections between the body and mind.



Dear Parents,

As October comes to a close, we are proud to celebrate another productive month of learning and exploration! Our students have been engaging deeply with challenging topics across physics and mathematics, developing both conceptual understanding and problem-solving skills. Here's a brief look at what each class has been working on:

Physics: Students explored vectors and two-dimensional kinematics, learning how to represent motion using vector components, displacement, velocity, and acceleration in multiple directions. They practiced resolving vectors, interpreting motion graphs, and solving problems involving


projectiles and relative motion. These concepts set the foundation for future topics such as dynamics and energy.


AP Physics 1: This month, students completed the unit on dynamics—the study of forces and motion. They examined Newton's laws in detail, applied free-body diagrams to analyze real-world situations, and explored friction, tension, and normal forces. Through lab work and problem-solving sessions, they built a stronger connection between mathematical models and physical phenomena.

AP Physics 2: Students began their unit on electric circuits, investigating electric current, resistance, and Ohm's law. They are learning how to analyze simple series and parallel circuits, as well as how potential difference drives charge flow. Hands-on simulations and experiments will continue into next month as they deepen their understanding of circuit behavior and power relationships.


AP Precalculus: In AP Precalculus, students studied arithmetic and geometric sequences and exponential functions. They explored how recursive and explicit formulas describe patterns, and how exponential models can represent real-world growth and decay. The class also practiced connecting symbolic, graphical, and numerical representations to strengthen their mathematical fluency.

Algebra 1: Students focused on radicals and scientific notation, learning how to simplify radical expressions, perform operations with roots, and express very large or small numbers using scientific notation. These skills are vital for applying algebra in science and technology contexts.























Dear Parents,

We're quite into Quarter 2 now and students have come back recharged after the October break. The Biology students are studying Photosynthesis in their classes and this is how they showed their learning about the process.

Bringing Photosynthesis to Life!- Biology class

As part of their exploration of the topic Photosynthesis, our Biology students participated in a series of engaging and creative group activities designed to deepen their understanding of this essential life process. The class transformed into a vibrant learning lab where science met art, drama, and storytelling.

Each group selected one of five interactive tasks — from creating a poster on "The Journey of Photosynthesis" to performing a lively role play titled "The Leaf Factory." Some students expressed their scientific creativity through comic strips illustrating "A Day in the Life of a Chloroplast," while others penned imaginative diary entries from a leaf's perspective. The final challenge, "If There Were No Photosynthesis," encouraged learners to reflect critically on the importance of this process for all life on Earth.

In just 25 minutes of preparation and a brief 2–3-minute presentation, students showcased not only their grasp of photosynthesis but also their collaboration, creativity, and communication skills. The classroom buzzed with energy and enthusiasm as science concepts came alive through visuals, dialogue, and innovation. This activity truly exemplified how experiential learning makes complex biological processes both memorable and meaningful.






























Chinese Department



We are proud to see our students learning to use Chinese in authentic and creative ways. Thank you for your continued support and encouragement!









ADVANCED ART



Currently, students are studying **figure drawing**. They have learned about their dominant eye, how to accurately measure objects with a pencil while drawing, and have been practicing by sketching our Science Department's skeletons. This unit follows their study of anatomy in Biology, allowing for authentic cross-curricular connections with the science curriculum.


In addition, students have begun exploring **figure drawing in art history**, examining notable works such as *The Seated Scribe* and *Nike of Samothrace*,

both located in the Louvre Museum in Paris, France. As the unit progresses, students will study additional artworks and create their own long observational drawings.

Advanced Art students completed their Bent Pattern and Transparency compositions a few weeks ago. For this project, students were challenged to design original compositions incorporating both an origami paper crane and transparent objects. They drew upon their extensive preliminary work to support the rendering of their final pieces in a medium of their choice. Once complete, students wrote reflections, measured and cut mats for their artwork, and prepared their pieces for display. These delightful works of art can be found on the 3rd floor of Building 3. Here are some examples of their work.

ART 1

Art 1 students have begun their printmaking unit. They started by watching videos about the different types of printmaking and then began researching possible subject matter. Both sections voted to focus on insects as their theme.

Students researched three different insects before narrowing their selection to one. Once they chose their final insect, they created detailed anatomical drawings to better understand its structure and features. In class, we used jeweler's loupes to take a closer look at real specimens, helping students make meaningful connections between art and science.

Students have now completed their final drawings, which will be transferred onto their lino blocks. After learning about lino blade safety, they will practice carving before moving on to their final prints.





DIGITAL ART



Digital Art students have been learning about typography and company design for the last few weeks. Students were taught a wide variety of tools that help manipulate type on Adobe Illustrator. Students were given time to experiment with what they learned in order to have scaffolding for their logo design unit.



For our main project, students created a fake company, voted a product focus, invented a company name and have finished creating their logos for it. This year, students opted for a donut company. In order to help students with their design process and avoid cliches, they needed to think outside of the box. Most companies who



ask designers to create logos, provide product samples, so the class were given the challenge to taste donuts and record what line, shape and colors came to mind in their sketchbooks. This hands on process was very helpful in getting students to think beyond cliche imagery and come up with ideas that were innovative and emotive. Students will finish up their unit and write a reflection about how they

created their final designs.



















Physical Education



Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

The Thailand Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

- The Personal Data Protection Act B.E. 2562 (2019) (PDPA) was published on 27 May 2019 in Thailand's Government Gazette.
 - (English, Thai)
- The PDPA is under the supervision of the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society and the main supervising authority of the PDPA is the Office of Data Protection Committee (Office).
- School is the "Data Controller" means a person or juristic person having decision-making on the collection, use, or disclosure of personal information (PDPA Section 6).

Personal Data	Sensitive Data
Any information relating to a natural person, which enables the identification of such person, whether directly or indirectly, but not including information of deceased persons.	Any personal data pertaining to: racial or ethnic origin political opinions religious or philosophical beliefs sexual behavior criminal records health data, disability trade union information genetic data, biometric data, or any data which may affect the data subject in the same manner as to be prescribed by the PDPC.

In essence, the PDPA is designed to protect a data owner from the unauthorized or unlawful collection, use, or disclosure and processing of their personal data. As with Europe's GDPR, for example, websites will have to include simple and straightforward language, and receive clear consent from each user, before (or at the time of) collecting such data, using it in any way, or passing it along to third parties.

Another key aspect under the PDPA is the requirement to inform the data subject of (i) how their personal data will be used by the data controller, (ii) whether personal data will be disclosed to a third party, and (iii) of the data subject's rights to their personal data. This must be done at the time the personal data is being collected from the data subject.

The rights of data owners under the PDPA include the following:

- Right to be informed
- Right to access
- Right to data portability
- Right to object
- Right to erasure/ right to be forgotten
- Right to restrict of processing
- Right to rectify

Even foreign entities will need to follow the rules spelled out in the PDPA, as long as they deal with any activities that are related to the processing of personal data such as offering of goods and services or monitoring of users' online behavior, from users who are based in Thailand.

There are both criminal and civil liabilities for breaches of personal data privacy. For instance, the collection, use or disclosure of sensitive personal data illegally is liable to a fine of five million baht on conviction. Collection, use or

disclosure of general personal data without a legal basis is liable to a three million baht fine on conviction, and failing to get consent from data's owner or refusing the data's owner access to their personal data is liable to a one million baht fine on conviction.

If the unauthorized use or disclosure of personal data causes damage to other people or subjects other people to hate, shame or contempt, violators may face six months in prison and/or a fine of 500,000 baht on conviction.

Nurse: School Health Services

The Nurse Clinic is a spacious and well staffed facility at TCIS that can accommodate several students at any given time of the day. The Nurse Clinic is open daily from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The clinic is located on the ground floor next to the storeroom and staffed by a registered nurse and one nurse's aid. The clinic treats all minor injuries occurring at school. The athletics program has a school nurse who works until the sports games finish.

The clinic stays in touch with the Ministry of Public Health to keep abreast of health notifications. Current vaccination information is sent out to parents for their information and written consent. Students in grade 1 thru grade 6 may get some vaccinations from our nurse according to the Thai Ministry of Public Health. Records of previous vaccinations are kept on file with the school nurse.

A worldwide, comprehensive (24-hour) accident insurance coverage is provided for all students up to 60,000 baht yearly.
