

MAP Testing

Our MAP tests will begin on May 20th, 2025. A testing schedule will be shared with parents. MAP testing assesses students' skills in reading, language usage, and math providing a detailed picture of their academic progress. At TCIS, MAP results help teachers identify each student's strengths and areas for growth through personalized learning data. We use the results in our student data tracking sheet to assist us in building a full picture of the student while supporting individual student needs and promoting continuous growth.

WIDA ELL Testing

To assess the progress of our ELL students, we will begin our WIDA testing during the first half of May, 2025. The results of this important assessment will help us to understand how well students are progressing in their English language development and will guide teachers in providing targeted support to help students succeed both academically and socially.

We are excited to share an important update regarding the growth of our academic programs. On May 1–2, TCIS will host an official IB Diploma Programme (IBDP) Verification Visit as part of our candidacy process to offer the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme beginning in Grade 11.

What is the IB Diploma Programme?

The IB Diploma Programme (IBDP) is an internationally recognized, rigorous academic program for students aged 16–19. It challenges students to develop strong academic skills while fostering international-mindedness, critical thinking, and a spirit of inquiry. Students complete coursework across six subject areas, participate in the Theory of Knowledge course, write an independent Extended Essay, and engage in the Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS) program. The IBDP is respected worldwide for its emphasis on both academic excellence and personal growth.

Why is TCIS pursuing IB authorization?

Adding the IB Diploma Programme at TCIS reflects our mission to prepare students for success at top universities worldwide and to empower them as lifelong learners and global citizens. We believe the IBDP will complement our current curriculum by offering:

- A balanced and academically challenging program recognized internationally
- Opportunities for students to explore their passions through independent research and service learning
- Development of critical skills in writing, analysis, problem-solving, and intercultural understanding
- Greater access to competitive university admissions worldwide

Becoming an IB World School also strengthens TCIS' commitment to delivering innovative, inquiry-based education that prepares students to thrive in a complex, interconnected world.

Please read about the upcoming events related to College Counseling.

Course Selection - AP Classes: In order for your child to take an AP class next year, they must have a B or higher in their current English course and a B+ or higher in the subject-related course (for example, a B+ or higher in Biology if they want to take AP Biology). Please check in with your child about their grades this year.

Grade 10 - PSAT Score Reports: Our Grade 10 students took the PSAT on March 4th. TCIS gave students their Score Reports on April 3rd. You can also review their score through their College Board accounts.

Grade 11: Please check with your child to ensure they are completing all the items on the <u>Junior Year Checklist</u>. If your child plans to apply to a Taiwanese university, they should meet with Mr. Tony to ensure all application materials are finished *before* summer vacation.

Grade 12 - College Application Season: Most students have finalized their plans for next year. Please check in on your child's progress and offer support if needed. Don't hesitate to contact us if you have any questions or concerns.







English & Humanities Department

Dear Parents,

I'm excited to share an update from our **AP Research** class, where students are wrapping up an impressive year of inquiry, analysis, and academic growth.

Over the past few weeks, students completed their **Presentations of Defense** (**PODs**)—a major milestone in the AP Research process. In these presentations, students defended their research question, explained their methodology, and shared early findings with a panel. It was amazing to see their confidence, depth of understanding, and ability to think critically under pressure. They truly rose to the occasion and represented TCIS with excellence.

Now, students are diving into the final phase of the course: their **AP Research Paper**, which is due **April 30th**. This paper is the culmination of months of independent research and will include a comprehensive discussion of their findings, implications, and the journey of inquiry they've taken throughout the year. It's a rigorous task, but our students are more than ready.

I am incredibly proud of the dedication and academic maturity our AP Research students have shown. From refining complex research questions to analyzing data and crafting their arguments, they've grown tremendously as scholars and thinkers.

Thank you for your continued support at home—whether it's encouraging them during long writing sessions, asking them about their research topics, or simply reminding them to take a break when needed. Every bit helps!

Dear Parents,

Happy April! I hope that you all had a wonderful Songkran Break and had a chance for some fun, relaxation, or perhaps a bit of both. The next several weeks are crunch time for a lot of classes, as we still have a lot more work to do. It is important that the students remain focused and working hard right until the end of the year. I hope that you all have a great rest of your April and a magnificent start to the month of May.

In Modern World History, we have finished with our brief unit on the American Civil War. Even though it was a short unit, the students were engaged and learned a lot about this conflict in world history and the impact that it has had on American society in the modern day. We are currently getting started with our unit on World War I. This is a really interesting time in world history, especially since it is often overshadowed by the second World War. One of the themes we will be discussing during this unit is the use of propaganda and how this can influence people and shape public opinion. I am really excited to dive into this unit.


In World Geography and Culture, we have finished our unit on the geography and culture of Europe and have begun our unit on the geography and culture of North and South America. There are many different cultures, ethnic groups, geographical features, and current sociopolitical issues in North and South America, so there will be no shortage of learning taking place. We will be especially focusing on the indigenous people of these regions and how their society and culture has changed over time. My hope is that the students will have a new, more complete understanding of the geography and culture of these regions of the world.

In AP Human Geography, we have completed our Mock Exams at the end of March and have spent some time reviewing these in class. The students did an alright job overall but it is clear that they need to be heavily reviewing the course content–especially from some of the earlier units. We are now into our final unit, which is shorter than the others and is all about economic, industrial, and social development. Once we are finished with this unit, we will have a chunk of time to review for the AP Exam on May 19th. It is super important that the students are spending some time each day reviewing and preparing for the AP Exam.

Dear Parents,

Welcome back after hopefully, a very restful and fun Songkran break. I know for myself the rest was needed and I hope yourself and your family was able to have a wonderful vacation or be able to catch up with family.

After Songkran classes are moving quite quickly. As there is only 3 weeks until AP exams, meaning for many students this time is highly stressful and also tiring. Please remind them to sleep and eat enough as this time for students historically has shown to be a high stress few weeks.

AP Psychology

All the content is complete and the students are at the point of perfecting the small details. Class will be filled with review games and practice test questions.

AP Macroeconomics

All the content is complete and many students have shown mastery in this content area. Now it is the point of finalizing the details of the graphs and understanding the test level English required for the exam.

Business Economics

Students have wrapped up their essay and are now ready to move onto the debate portion of the class. This time of the class is usually a time of fun while also learning the difficult task of "nuanced discussion". The content will be focused on complex issues in modern society and having a discussion of those issues from different lenses.

Advanced Business Economics

The students completed a difficult assignment of writing multiple essays and connecting the real world, articles about business within the past year and content from the class. They completed 4 essays and now the next assignment is to try to predict the future. As the students have looked at theoretical issues and tried to solve them, current real world issues, and now they will try to use that to look deeper into the world and attempt to foresee the difficulties that can arise in their adulthood.

Philosophy, Politics, and Ethics

Students completed a unit about the future issue of rare earth minerals and completed a roleplay of Model United Nations to try to fix and complete the task. It was a very interesting conversation to observe and will try to dig deeper into this content. Specifically with the current geo political issues arising between China and USA.

Dear Parents,

As we move into the final stretch of the school year, I wanted to share some important updates from our English classes.

AP Language and Composition

We have officially completed all regular course instruction. Students are currently participating in our AP Exam Review Bootcamp, where we are focusing on refining skills in rhetorical analysis, argument, and synthesis essays. Our goal is to build confidence and readiness for the AP Language and Composition Exam on May 14.

After the AP exam, we will complete a short literary analysis unit. This unit is designed to prepare students who are planning to continue to AP Literature next year and to strengthen critical reading and writing skills for all students as they head into summer.

Please encourage your student to continue reviewing at home by practicing timed writing, revisiting key rhetorical strategies, and completing practice multiple-choice sets. Consistent, focused review makes a significant difference.

British Literature

British Literature students have just completed their Beowulf Final Projects. I was impressed by the creativity and insight students showed in analyzing the important characters of this story to create trading cards for this epic.

This week, we are beginning our final unit on Contemporary British Literature, which will take us through the end of the school year. Students will select a modern British novel for independent study, analyzing key literary elements such as characterization, theme, structure, and style. This independent project allows students to build their skills as critical readers and literary analysts while exploring contemporary voices in British writing.

We have been finishing up old projects and beginning final ones in all of our media classes in preparation for the end of the year.

Film: Our film class has finished their Crime Films and have begun writing their New Film Scripts. This time, the students are allowed to pick their own genre. With the new information and skills they have related to editing and camera placement, their next scripts should be an interesting mix of content. Later this week we will all read every script and have a final vote on who's script will be made into a film this time around.

Journalism: Our journalism students did a nice job of covering a true life event when Thailand and TCIS experienced an earthquake back on March 28th. Students interviewed our high school principal, and other students did a global report for their next episode of The Wednesday Show. Currently our students are working to create their last Monthly Video of the school year. This segment is focused on reporting on a specific location and comes after studying the journalism styles of two well established journalists from the US. I look forward to seeing these new and creative new segments at the end of April.

Digital Media: In Digital Media class, we have been focusing on creating commercials. First we created realistic commercials for everyday products like earbuds and Gatorade. Next we created "spoof" ads of different products. Students created humorous commercials parodies for products from "Al Girlfriend" to "Uno." Check out our YouTube channel to see some of these great commercials.

Creative Writing: Here in creative writing, we are just finishing up our poetry anthologies. Each student was tasked with writing six original poems. After studying and analyzing some famous poetry and even some song lyrics, the students are well prepared to create their own original works. This week we will begin our last unit of the year where we will learn some stage directions and write our own original one act plays.

Dear Parents,

As we strive to improve and maximize our in-game performance so that we can get the W, sometimes it's those seemingly smaller details that can make the difference. We've looked into game mechanics, sleep hygiene, nutrition, and Esports psychology. In addition to all of that, we recently had a brief focus on **good posture** for gaming success.

We explored how maintaining correct posture is key to maximizing gaming performance. Whether you're grinding through ranked matches or streaming your favorite titles, good posture helps reduce fatigue, prevent injuries, and boost focus during extended play sessions.

We dug into some of the most common posture-related challenges gamers face, like:

Hunching over controllers or keyboards

Poor chair support

Monitor positioning

Extended sedentary time without movement

Students learned how to optimize their gaming setups to support their bodies—because you can't go pro if your back gives out first! From proper desk height to ergonomic chairs, we looked at how small tweaks can make a big impact.

Dream Setup Designs

As part of the learning, students started designing their "dream" gaming spaces, with a twist: every part of the setup had to prioritize healthy posture and **ergonomic** design. We saw some awesome plans that balanced aesthetics, comfort, and competitive edge.

Next, students will learn about the specific challenges gamers face with muscle tension and soreness, and how **stretching** can help alleviate these problems. Students will try out a series of back, neck, and hand stretches, and create their own combo stretching routine for gaming.

Stay tuned for more updates as we continue building smarter, healthier, and more competitive gaming lifestyles!

Dear Parents,

I hope everyone had an amazing holiday break! Check out what your math students have been up to below.

Geometry/Algebra II: In this unit, students deepened their understanding of polynomial functions. They practiced graphing polynomials, identifying roots and multiplicity, and solving polynomial equations by factoring. The class also learned to divide polynomials using both long division and synthetic division, applying the Remainder Theorem to check their work. To wrap up the unit, students explored function operations and compositions—important tools for understanding how functions can work together.

Algebra II: In this part of the unit, students continued their work with exponential and logarithmic equations, focusing on solving equations using both common bases and logarithms. They were introduced to the natural base eee and natural logarithms, expanding their understanding of exponential relationships. To connect these concepts to real life, students applied their skills to exponential growth, decay, and compound interest problems. These lessons help students see how math models change over time in the real world.

Geometry: In this unit, students explored the concept of similarity through ratios, proportions, and similar figures. They practiced using proportions to find missing side lengths and learned how to prove triangles are similar using SSS, SAS, and AA criteria. The unit concluded with writing proofs involving similar triangles, helping students strengthen both their reasoning and problem-solving skills.

As we head into the final stretch of the school year, I wanted to share an update on what's happening in each of our classes. Students are hard at work, preparing for exams, wrapping up projects, and deepening their understanding across a wide range of subjects. Here's a quick look at what's going on:

AP Calculus AB

Our AP Calculus students are in full exam prep mode! We've been going over mock exam results, discussing strategies for improvement, and reviewing key concepts. I'm offering individual help and reteaching as needed to ensure every student feels confident going into the AP Exam, which will take place on May 22 at noon. Your support at home—encouraging review and rest—is much appreciated during this time!

AP Computer Science A

Students are currently engaged in independent review for their AP Exam on May 7 at noon. They're using various resources and practicing past FRQs to sharpen their skills. I'm available for extra help and feedback as they prepare. It's exciting to see them taking ownership of their learning!

+ Algebra 1

We've launched a Project-Based Learning (PBL) unit on exponential functions—specifically, how they apply to real-world scenarios like bank accounts and compound interest. Students are working in groups to research and evaluate different types of savings accounts. They'll present their findings and make recommendations for short-term, medium-term, and long-term savings goals. It's been a fun and practical application of math in daily life!

Foundations of Math

In Foundations of Math, students are following an independent guided study model. Each week, they focus on areas aligned with their personal strengths and needs, completing an instructional unit, an assessment, and a project that showcases their learning. It's a wonderful opportunity for them to take charge of their growth and see their progress over time.

Computer Coding

We're wrapping up our final unit on Python and moving into two small coding projects before students begin their final project, which will serve as their final exam. This culminating project must demonstrate a deep understanding of the semester's concepts and allow students to get creative while solving a problem of their choice. I can't wait to see what they build!

This month in the high school math classroom, we've been wrapping up final content before AP exams and final exams in May/June:

In AP Calculus BC, students are preparing for the AP exam on May 22nd. Students are practicing as many past papers as possible to best prepare themselves for the exam! They should be utilizing the content provided for them in the AP Classroom to help them get ready!

In Calculus, students are finishing their final unit on Differential Equations, Slope Fields, Area Between Curves and Volume of Revolving Solids. They will have an exam on these concepts at the end of April. During the month of May, students will have an opportunity to study and present some advanced calculus techniques to their classmates, i.e. integration by parts, partial fraction decomposition and improper integration. We will then begin reviewing for the cumulative final exam taking place at the end of May/beginning of June!

In AP Statistics, students are preparing for the AP exam on May 8th. Students are practicing as many past papers as possible to best prepare themselves for the exam! They should be utilizing the content provided for them in the AP Classroom to help them get ready!

Robotics I:

Robotics I students kicked off their Mechanical Foundations unit by experimenting with different types of wheels on a basic drivetrain. The wheels tested included 2.75" standard wheels, traction wheels, omni-directional wheels, and mecanum wheels. Students observed how each wheel type affected the robot's movement, maneuverability, and overall handling.

In addition to wheel testing, students explored drivetrain configurations by building and programming both 2-motor and 4-motor drivetrains. They compared these setups in terms of control, power, and performance, gaining a deeper understanding of how motor count influences speed, torque, and stability in robot design.














Robotics II

Following the end of the VEX VRC season, the four robotics teams were divided into eight smaller groups to focus on refining the elevation component of this year's game. Using both their competition robots and a simplified training bot, students brainstormed, built, and tested various strategies and mechanisms aimed at improving lift and elevation. This phase allowed teams to iterate on their designs and better understand what makes an effective scoring mechanism.

In the next unit, students shifted their focus to understanding, designing, and building a flywheel mechanism. They explored the fundamentals of flywheel mechanics and their real-world applications in robotics. After researching and analyzing different flywheel designs, students applied engineering principles to build their own custom mechanisms. To evaluate their prototypes, students incorporated physics concepts such as projectile motion and energy transfer, calculating the optimal launch angle and velocity needed to reach specific goal heights. Through a process of iterative testing and refinement, they enhanced the performance, consistency, and accuracy of their flywheels. To conclude the unit, students designed their own game scenario by assigning point values to goals placed at varying locations on the field. The challenge was to score the highest number of points in 60 seconds using their flywheel mechanism. This fun, competitive wrap-up showcased their creativity, problem-solving, and engineering skills in a dynamic and engaging way.



Dear Parents,

We are back from our one-week Songkran break, and I hope it gave everyone a chance to rest and recharge. Now that we are in the final stretch of the school year, there is still a great deal of work ahead. Students may already be thinking about summer, but it is important to stay focused and motivated. We still have major concepts to cover and assessments to prepare for. Let's finish the year with the same determination we started with.

In **Chemistry**, we have just begun shifting our attention from analyzing substances to exploring how those substances react with one another. This marks an exciting phase of the course, where students begin to see the full picture of chemical processes. A key concept introduced is the mole, which is not an animal but a very large number used to quantify particles. Students are learning how to calculate the results of chemical reactions, including the products and quantities that form. These ideas will set the stage for more complex problems and lab work.

In **AP Chemistry**, we have officially completed all nine units of course content. We are now fully focused on preparation and practice for the AP exam. At this stage, our goal is to identify each student's biggest areas of confusion and target those with specific review strategies. Practice questions and timed activities are helping to build confidence. With steady effort, the students are well on track for success.

In **Anatomy and Physiology**, we have just finished learning about the digestive system. After a short review and a test, we will move on to the urinary system and explore the role of the kidneys and bladder. From there, we will begin our unit on the reproductive system. We will end the year with a study of blood and the cardiopulmonary system. It is an ambitious end to the year, but an exciting one as well.

In **Health Science**, we are now focused on sexual education. Students are encouraged to ask questions anonymously, which has allowed for honest and meaningful discussions. There is clearly a lot of curiosity and interest, and we are creating a respectful space for learning. We are covering the anatomy and functions of the reproductive system, and discussing related topics with care and maturity. The goal is to provide students with factual knowledge while helping them think critically and responsibly about their sexual health.

As we approach the end of April, students are making great progress in their academic journeys! April has been a month of milestones, and I'm excited to share updates from each of our classes as we head into the final stretch of the school year.

AP Physics: Students have successfully completed the AP Physics curriculum! Our focus has shifted to intensive content review in preparation for the upcoming AP exam. Students are engaging in targeted practice, lab review sessions, and test-taking strategies to ensure they feel confident and well-prepared.

AP Precalculus: I'm proud to report that the AP Precalculus curriculum has been completed! Students are now devoting their time to thorough review and exam preparation. The focus is on reinforcing problem-solving techniques and mastering the most challenging concepts through guided practice and collaborative review.

Physics: Students have just wrapped up a dynamic unit on Circular Motion and Gravitation as well as Simple Machines. Their curiosity and enthusiasm have been commendable, and they are now transitioning into two exciting new unit of Electrostatics and Electric Circuits.

Precalculus: After a successful unit on Analytic Trigonometry, students are moving forward to tackle Systems of Equations and Matrices. These concepts build foundational skills for higher-level mathematics and are essential for problem-solving in real-world applications.

As we enter the final stretch of the school year, students are continuing to engage actively in their learning. With only a few months left, it is more important than ever that students remain focused, review material regularly, and participate fully in class. Your encouragement at home plays a vital role in helping them finish the year strong. Below is a summary of what we have been working on in each class this past month.

AP Biology: This month, students completed Unit 6 on Gene Expression and Regulation and have nearly finished Unit 7 on Natural Selection. These units explore how genes are turned on and off in response to the environment, as well as how populations evolve over time. Students also completed a full-length mock AP Biology exam as practice for the upcoming AP exam in May. With the test date approaching quickly, students should now be revisiting earlier units and working on targeted review strategies, including practice questions and concept reinforcement.

Biology: Our focus this month was photosynthesis. Students explored how plants convert sunlight into chemical energy through engaging lab investigations. In one lab, they used chromatography to separate and identify the pigments in plant leaves, which helped them understand the variety of pigments involved in photosynthesis. In another lab, they examined leaf stomata to observe how plants exchange gases with the environment. These hands-on experiences deepened their understanding of this essential life process. We are now preparing for a unit test on photosynthesis, after which we will begin studying cellular respiration and evolution.

Psychology: Students have been learning about social psychology, a fascinating area that examines how people's thoughts and behaviors are influenced by others. We have discussed several classic experiments, such as those by Milgram and Asch, and considered their long-term impact on psychology and society. Each student has taken on the responsibility of researching one of these influential studies and will present their findings as we move through the topics. In class, we are also participating in interactive activities that demonstrate the key principles from these studies, helping students connect theory to real-world behavior.

Environmental Science: After concluding our unit on soil, we have shifted our attention to water—a topic that is increasingly relevant in today's world. Students have learned about global water distribution, water scarcity in different regions, and the challenges of ensuring water security. We have discussed the importance of sustainable water use and the social and environmental implications of water shortages. In the coming weeks, we will delve into the role of water in food production, the causes and consequences of water pollution, and potential strategies for conservation and sustainable management.


They used the vocabulary they learned then created a four-panel comic about the environment and told the story in Chinese.



















Traveling Chinese - Hakka culture



Dear Parents,

To begin quarter 4 our PE classes chose between invasion games including hockey, basketball, and soccer. Each activity began with an introduction to tactics and strategies, an assortment of basic skills and drills, and quickly progressed to small-sided games. As these units wrap up the last units of PE will emphasize practical nutrition knowledge and food preparation skills and health.

Our strength and conditioning completed the introduction to the ATP-PCr system with short-duration (3-6 seconds) sprints, hops, and jump. They began learning about the glycolytic energy system (30-40 seconds running) at 70% effort with about 2-½ minutes rest. To wrap up quarter 4 students will learn practical nutrition strategies and put together their sports conditioning programs to perform until the end of the year.

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


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

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Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

The Thailand Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

- The Personal Data Protection Act B.E. 2562 (2019) (PDPA) was published on 27 May 2019 in Thailand's Government Gazette.
 - (English, Thai)
- The PDPA is under the supervision of the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society and the main supervising authority of the PDPA is the Office of Data Protection Committee (Office).
- School is the "Data Controller" means a person or juristic person having decision-making on the collection, use, or disclosure of personal information (PDPA Section 6).

Personal Data	Sensitive Data
Any information relating to a natural person, which enables the identification of such person, whether directly or indirectly, but not including information of deceased persons.	Any personal data pertaining to: racial or ethnic origin political opinions religious or philosophical beliefs sexual behavior criminal records health data, disability trade union information genetic data, biometric data, or any data which may affect the data subject in the same manner as to be prescribed by the PDPC.

In essence, the PDPA is designed to protect a data owner from the unauthorized or unlawful collection, use, or disclosure and processing of their personal data. As with Europe's GDPR, for example, websites will have to include simple and straightforward language, and receive clear consent from each user, before (or at the time of) collecting such data, using it in any way, or passing it along to third parties.

Another key aspect under the PDPA is the requirement to inform the data subject of (i) how their personal data will be used by the data controller, (ii) whether personal data will be disclosed to a third party, and (iii) of the data subject's rights to their personal data. This must be done at the time the personal data is being collected from the data subject.

The rights of data owners under the PDPA include the following:

- Right to be informed
- Right to access
- Right to data portability
- Right to object
- Right to erasure/ right to be forgotten
- Right to restrict of processing
- Right to rectify

Even foreign entities will need to follow the rules spelled out in the PDPA, as long as they deal with any activities that are related to the processing of personal data such as offering of goods and services or monitoring of users' online behavior, from users who are based in Thailand.

There are both criminal and civil liabilities for breaches of personal data privacy. For instance, the collection, use or disclosure of sensitive personal data illegally is liable to a fine of five million baht on conviction. Collection, use or disclosure of general personal data without a legal basis is liable to a three million baht fine on conviction, and failing to get

consent from data's owner or refusing the data's owner access to their personal data is liable to a one million baht fine on conviction.

If the unauthorized use or disclosure of personal data causes damage to other people or subjects other people to hate, shame or contempt, violators may face six months in prison and/or a fine of 500,000 baht on conviction.

Nurse: School Health Services

The Nurse Clinic is a spacious and well staffed facility at TCIS that can accommodate several students at any given time of the day. The Nurse Clinic is open daily from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The clinic is located on the ground floor next to the storeroom and staffed by a registered nurse and one nurse's aid. The clinic treats all minor injuries occurring at school. The athletics program has a school nurse who works until the sports games finish.

The clinic stays in touch with the Ministry of Public Health to keep abreast of health notifications. Current vaccination information is sent out to parents for their information and written consent. Students in grade 1 thru grade 6 may get some vaccinations from our nurse according to the Thai Ministry of Public Health. Records of previous vaccinations are kept on file with the school nurse.

A worldwide, comprehensive (24-hour) accident insurance coverage is provided for all students up to 60,000 baht yearly.
