
Dear TCIS Family,

Congratulations to the Winners of the Sermpanya Thailand Proficiency Test! The Thai Department successfully organized the Sermpanya Thailand Proficiency Test for the academic year 2024–2025. The test covered various subjects including Thai Language, Social Studies, English, Advanced English, Mathematics, Advanced Mathematics, Science, Advanced Science, and the Thai General Aptitude Test (TGAT).

This initiative aims to promote and enhance students' academic skills, as well as to prepare them for the TGAT, a standardized test designed to assess students' readiness for university-level studies in Thailand. Through this opportunity, students gain valuable

experience by participating in a nationally recognized examination, helping them build confidence and prepare for future academic competitions. In addition, the test results can serve as part of their academic portfolio and may be used to fulfill university entrance requirements.




#### WASC Visit

#### Dr. James Posters : All Black vs. Preppy Day!







Your commitment has been instrumental in making this year a productive and enriching experience for everyone involved.

Congratulations to our **Grade 12** students for finishing their final year of high school! I look forward to celebrating their achievements during graduation and know they all have bright futures ahead of them.

#### Next Steps in the College Counseling Process

As we transition into the summer months, it is important for students to continue progressing in their college preparation journey. Here are some key steps and activities to consider:

- 1. **Deciding on a Major:** Students should take time to explore their interests and strengths. Online resources such as career assessment tools and informational interviews with professionals can provide valuable insights.
- 2. **Exploring University Options:** Students should research and compile a list of potential universities. Utilize virtual tours and university websites to gather information about academic programs, campus life, and admission requirements.
- 3. Participating in Activities:
  - **Summer Camps and Internships:** Engaging in summer programs related to academic interests or future career goals can enhance students' resumes and provide hands-on experience.
  - Volunteer Hours: Remember, students are required to complete 40 volunteer hours to graduate. Local organizations, community centers, and non-profits often have volunteer opportunities available during the summer.
- 4. Test Preparation:
  - **SAT and IELTS:** Summer is a great time to prepare for these important exams. Consider enrolling in test prep courses or utilizing online resources to practice and improve scores.
- 5. Working on Applications:
  - **Essays, Portfolios, and Resumes:** Encourage students to start drafting their college application essays, updating resumes, and organizing portfolios. This preparation will alleviate stress during the application season.

#### **Grade-Level Specific Activities**

Students can find specific information about events and activities in Bangkok on their Google Classroom pages. I have also included some general recommendations for each grade level.

#### Grade 9:

- Academic Exploration: Encourage students to explore a variety of subjects to identify their interests.
- Volunteer Work: Begin accumulating volunteer hours by participating in community service.
- Extracurricular Activities: Join clubs, sports, or other school activities to develop skills and interests.
- Academic Enrichment: Consider attending academic summer camps or workshops.

#### Grade 10:

- **Career Exploration:** Use career assessment tools and start thinking about potential majors and careers related to your interests.
- University Research: Explore possible universities and start creating a list of universities that you might want to attend. Visit universities if possible, to get a feel for campus life.
- Volunteer Hours: Continue to accumulate volunteer hours; you should have at least 20 hours completed by the end of Grade 10
- Academic Enrichment: Consider attending academic summer camps, workshops, or completing internships.
- Standardized Test Preparation: Begin familiarizing with the SAT and IELTS formats.

#### Grade 11:

- University Research: Start creating a list of universities of interest and understand their admission requirements. Visit universities if possible, to get a feel for campus life.
- Volunteer and Internships: Engage in meaningful volunteer work or internships related to potential career interests.
- Test Preparation: Intensify preparation for SAT and IELTS exams.
- College Essays, Portfolios, and Resumes: Begin drafting college application essays, portfolios, and resumes.

#### Grade 12:

- Finalizing College List: Narrow down university choices and ensure you meet all application requirements.
- Complete Testing: Prepare for and take the SAT and IELTS, if you have not already done so.
- Application Preparation: Complete college application essays, portfolios, and resumes.
- Campus Visits: Visit universities if possible, to get a feel for campus life.

#### **Recommendations for Summer Activities**

As much as summer is a time for preparing for the future, it is equally important for students to take this opportunity to relax and enjoy quality time with their loved ones. Balancing preparation with relaxation will ensure students are recharged and ready for the upcoming school year. Here are some recommendations for a balanced summer:

- Volunteer Work: Fulfill the graduation requirement of 40 volunteer hours by participating in community service. This can be a rewarding way to give back and gain valuable experience.
- **University Campus Tours:** Even while on vacation, consider visiting local universities. Many campuses offer guided tours, and this can be an enlightening experience.

With the year about to end and the big exams completed, I'm looking forward to the final month of school. Classes will slow down a bit and focus more on bringing together the skills of the year into one large assignment that is more than just an exam. I know the AP students are relieved the exams are done and they are excited to take a well deserved break. I hope the end of the school year is great for your families and the summer break is well on its way.

AP Macroeconomics	With the year ending and the exams having been completed I am always eager to know the results from the exam, but everyone will have to wait until July to find their results. This year's test was a bit harder than the previous years and threw some tricks into the exam. I hope the students were able to dodge those tricks and still get a grade they deserve!
AP Psychology	The AP Psych exam was completed about a week ago and the students showed a level of confidence even though the exam was brand new this year. With the new exam format and style the students and myself were curious on how this will be done. It seems the preparations were worth it because the students said the exam was not harder than the practices.
Advanced Business	The final assignment is done for this class, as the class is nearly all seniors the class will drastically change once they are gone. The final assignment is their ability to bring together the content from the year into one large assignment that takes interviewing, presenting, and conversational skills. They looked at a product and looked deeper into the emotions or nuances from that product. The Presentations we great and was excited to learn about the perspectives of young students about things that are so common to see.
Philosophy, Politics, and Ethics	With the final assignment being an interesting one, the students were tasked to make an educational youtube/podcast about a historical event and compare it to modern and futuristic ideas. Having them take the skills of evidence based assumptions and turn it into an educational and fun assignment. The podcasts were cool to listen to and seeing the students' excitement to learn about a topic they chose was a great way to end the year.
Business Economics	The debate unit is rolling along and the students just completed the first main concept - Linestanding -which is a great way to talk about the concepts of capitalism and communism from a more hands on context. The next concept is market manipulation and looking at concepts like price gouging to help understand the uniqueness of the responses form different shareholders in an economic crisis.

As we move into the final weeks of the school year, both AP Language and British Literature students are transitioning into one of the most exciting and enriching parts of their coursework: literary analysis.

In AP Language & Composition, we celebrated the completion of the exam-related content by creating memes that represent the AP Lang student experience and offering advice for the next cohort. Students are now diving into a final unit that emphasizes how authors use literary devices, structure, and style to convey complex ideas. Meanwhile, in British Literature, students have just wrapped up their Contemporary British Fiction Student's Choice unit. It's been inspiring to see them independently explore modern voices and share insights across a range of compelling texts. Now, they too will shift into a focused literary analysis unit, with an emphasis on interpreting meaning across both short fiction and film. Students will examine how authors and directors craft mood, theme, and character through a variety of storytelling techniques.

Though the end of the school year is near, our goal in both classes is to finish strong-not just in terms of grades, but in terms of growth. Thank you for your continued support as our students continue to stretch their thinking, refine their writing, and reflect on how far they've come.

#### Journalism:





As we continue our journey through the world of Esports, our lessons have focused on both **mental wellness** and **game design fundamentals**, helping students grow as both players and creators.

## **Esports Psychology: Mindset and Mentality**

This week, students explored how strong emotions such as **fear**, **anger**, **and frustration** can impact their performance and relationships within the gaming

community. Through engaging discussions and hands-on exercises, they learned valuable tools and techniques, including:

- Mindfulness techniques for staying grounded during moments of intense emotion.
- The concept of a "**no-judgment zone**", encouraging open, respectful communication and acceptance.
- Embracing a **growth mindset**, helping students understand that mistakes are opportunities to learn and improve rather than signs of failure.

Students reflected on how emotional regulation contributes to better gameplay, stronger team dynamics, and a more positive gaming environment.

## **Stress Management and Resilience**

In our **Stress Management** unit, students learned about the **types of stress**, the **fight-or-flight response**, and how to identify and prevent **burnout**. They practiced:

- Breathing exercises to calm the nervous system and promote clarity.
- Monitoring stress levels during gameplay and discussing their emotional responses.
- Differentiating between **psychological well-being** and temporary happiness, and understanding how both affect gaming performance.

They also worked on breaking down large goals into smaller, manageable steps—an essential skill for both gaming and life.

## Game Design: Introduction to Unreal Engine

In addition to our focus on emotional resilience, students also began exploring the world of **game design** using **Unreal Engine**, a leading platform in 3D game development. This course serves as a comprehensive introduction to Unreal Engine, designed to equip students with the essential skills needed to create immersive environments and interactive gameplay.


We began with "Navigation in Unreal Engine," introducing key components such as the viewport, actors, and content browser. This foundational knowledge will empower students to begin building their own 3D worlds, sparking creativity and laying the groundwork for future development projects.

# **Math Department**

#### Mr. Matt



Dear Parents,

**Geometry/Algebra II:** In this unit, students strengthened their understanding of radicals and rational exponents. They practiced dividing radicals, rationalizing denominators, and reviewing key exponent rules. Students then applied these skills to solve radical equations and explored how square root and cube root functions behave on a graph. These lessons built both algebraic fluency and a deeper understanding of function behavior.

**Algebra II:** In this unit, students worked with rational expressions, learning how to add, subtract, multiply, and divide them, including simplifying complex fractions. They applied these skills in real-world contexts and reviewed all operations for mastery. Then, they transitioned into graphing rational functions, identifying key features such as intercepts, asymptotes, and holes. Students wrapped up the unit by solving rational equations and exploring how these functions behave across different domains.

**Geometry:** In this unit, students learned how to prove triangles are similar using the SSS, SAS, and AA similarity theorems. They practiced writing formal triangle similarity proofs and applied their understanding to explore how parallel lines create proportional parts within triangles. Students also examined relationships between corresponding parts of similar triangles, further reinforcing proportional reasoning and geometric structure.

#### Dear Parents,

It's been a very productive month in the high school math classroom. Here's what's been happening:

In AP Calculus BC, we have finished all content and are getting well-prepared for the AP exam on May 22nd. We are practicing as many exams as possible, both MCQ and FRQ sections (calculator and non-calculator). Once students finish the exam, they will be finished with the academic year as this exam is one of the last scheduled AP exams for our two seniors! Students are working hard to get the 5s I know they are capable of. Congratulations on finishing this challenging math course and best of luck to you both as you move on to the next big adventure!!

In AP Statistics, students have already finished their AP exam on May 8th. I'm confident that all students will get a 3 or higher on the exam as that is what their predicted and mock exam scores were. We are now working on a final project, where students have to investigate a research question with collected/existing data, use a statistical inference method to answer their question and write a reflection/conclusion piece. Students will present this project to the class during the first week of June as their final summative assessment of the quarter. I'm looking forward to seeing what they've done as this is a fantastic project to get students prepared for university academic research papers!

Lastly in Calculus, students have finished their last exam on slope fields, differential equations, area between curves, and volume of revolution of solids. Students did very well on this unit considering its difficulty, and they should be proud of what they've accomplished. Our second summative assessment will be a presentation, where students will pick an advanced integration technique (integration by parts, partial fraction decomposition, improper integral, logistical differential equations, Euler's Method) to present to the class. Each student chooses one topic to present during the third week of May and this will be the final project for seniors. Lastly our juniors have received a final exam review guide to study and will take their final summative assessment during the first week of June. Please get well-prepared for the final exam!

It's been a pleasure working with your children this year, and I hope you all have a great summer. I'm looking forward to seeing everyone again in August and wish them the best of luck with the rest of this school year and the beginning of the next! #### **Robotics I:**

Robotics I students concluded their Mechanical Foundations unit with a summative project that challenged them to design and build a drivetrain capable of climbing a 6-inch obstacle. The robot needed to demonstrate versatility by maneuvering smoothly on flat surfaces, successfully climbing over obstacles at least 6 inches tall, and landing in a stable position after descent. This was a demanding task that required a strong understanding of mechanical design, traction, and balance. Despite the difficulty, teams developed innovative solutions, with some designs coming very close to fully meeting all aspects of the challenge.



#### **Robotics II:**

Over the past few months, students have been actively exploring potential mechanisms for next season's game while completing a series of hands-on projects. The most recent and exciting was a cross-curricular project that combined robotics and media arts: designing and building a motorized camera slider using VEX V5 components for the Film Lab class. To begin, students researched how camera sliders are used in professional videography to create smooth, dynamic shots. Drawing from this research, they planned functional designs, carefully selecting components that would allow for precise control of movement and speed. Using V5 smart motors and sensors, they programmed their sliders to move with accuracy and repeatability, incorporating feedback from test runs to iterate and improve their builds. Throughout the project, students thoroughly documented their engineering process through detailed sketches, photographs, videos, and engineering notebook entries. The project wrapped up with final presentations where students showcased their fully operational camera sliders in action, demonstrating both technical skill and an understanding of real-world applications in film production.



## Mr. David



#### Dear Parents,

The final weeks of the school year are upon us, and while students are starting to look forward to their holidays, we still have important topics to cover and concepts to wrap up. With the departure of the seniors, their grades are being finalized, and the rest of our students continue their academic journey. This is a time for both reflection and focus. We want to ensure that everyone finishes strong and leaves the school year with a solid understanding of what they've learned. There is still a lot to be proud of and much to accomplish before summer begins.

In **Chemistry**, we are exploring the concept of concentration and how it affects chemical reactions, reaction yields, and equilibrium. This builds on many of the units and formulas we have already studied, helping students make deeper connections across topics. Students are applying their knowledge in hands-on laboratory activities designed to reinforce key ideas. These experiments help translate theory into practice and give students more confidence in their understanding. If time allows, we will finish the year with a brief introduction to the gas laws.

In **AP Chemistry**, students have now completed the AP exam, and the results will be available in the coming weeks. With the pressure of the exam behind us, we have shifted our focus to a more exploratory and hands-on approach. We are conducting labs and experiments to reinforce content while introducing students to new topics like organic chemistry. If time permits, we will also touch on nuclear chemistry and investigate the nature of nuclear reactions. This gives students a chance to explore the edges of the curriculum in a relaxed but still meaningful way.

In **Anatomy and Physiology**, we have completed our unit on the reproductive system and are now turning our attention to the cardiopulmonary system. This final system plays a crucial role in connecting all the body systems we have studied so far. Students are learning how blood circulates throughout the body to deliver oxygen and nutrients while also removing waste. We are examining how the heart and lungs work together to keep us alive and healthy. This is a fitting conclusion to a year of studying the many interrelated parts of the human body.

In **Health Science**, we are continuing our unit on sexual education, and the level of student engagement has remained high. Students are asking thoughtful questions and discussing sensitive topics with maturity and respect. Recently, we have been focusing on the importance of protection and precaution in sexual activity. This includes understanding how to use condoms correctly and becoming familiar with various birth control methods. The goal is to provide students with accurate, age-appropriate information to help them make safe and informed choices.

Final exams are just around the corner, and this is an important time for students to remain focused and consistent in their study habits. Regular review and preparation will go a long way toward helping them succeed. Students are encouraged to stay organized, ask questions when needed, and make use of available study resources. With the right effort and mindset, they can finish the year on a high note.

May has been a month of academic focus, creativity, and celebration of learning as students wrapped up their final units and prepared for important assessments.

#### **AP Physics:**

This month, AP Physics students have been engaged in intensive review sessions in preparation for the College Board AP Physics Exam. Having completed the full syllabus, students spent May working through practice problems, consolidating

key concepts, and refining test-taking strategies. I'm proud of their dedication and look forward to seeing their hard work reflected in their exam results.

### **Physics:**

Students in Physics are concluding the year with an exiting unit on Electrostatics and Electric Circuits. A major highlight was the student-led presentations on real-world applications of electrostatics, showcasing creativity, research, and communication skills. From explaining the science behind air purifiers to the role of electrostatics in photocopiers and lightning rods, students made powerful connections between theory and everyday technology.

## **AP Precalculus:**

May marked the final stretch for our AP Precalculus students, who completed the course curriculum and shifted into full review mode for the College Board AP Precalculus Exam. Students demonstrated impressive stamina and problem-solving abilities as they revisited core topics and tackled a variety of exam-style questions. I'm impressed by their perseverance and I'm optimistic about their performance.

### Precalculus:

In Precalculus, students focused on their final unit of study: Matrices. They explored matrix operations, applications in solving systems of equations, and the use of matrices in computer graphics and cryptography. This unit wrapped up the year's journey through advanced algebra and functions, providing a strong foundation for future mathematical studies.

Congratulations to all the students for their excellent achievements!






Dear parents,



Students practiced the traditional Thai greeting, the **Wai**, learning how to properly show respect to elders, teachers, and monks. They discovered the different levels of the Wai and when each is appropriate.

#### 2. Walking Past Adults (การเดินผ่านผู้ใหญ่)

Respectful movement is a key part of Thai manners. Our class practiced how to politely walk past adults by slightly lowering the body and offering a respectful gesture.

#### 3. Giving and Receiving Items (การรับ-ส่งของ)

Whether handing a document or passing a pen, students learned how to give and receive items with two hands or with one hand supported by the opposite arm, especially when interacting with older people or figures of authority.

These activities aren't just exercises—they are essential steps in understanding how to live harmoniously and respectfully in Thai society.

Our current unit explores Thai culture through food and drink.

**In TWL II (Gr. 10-11)** this month, they explored one of Thailand's most admired monarchs—King Chulalongkorn (Rama V). His visionary leadership, devotion to his people, and diplomatic brilliance left a lasting mark on Thai history. Our students participated in an engaging project where they:

1. Created a historical timeline of King Rama V's reign and achievements.

2. **Studied excerpts from his letters to his son**, Prince Vajiravudh, gaining insight into his wisdom and leadership values.

3. **Highlighted his royal duties** and contributions in beautifully designed posters displayed in the classroom.


These activities helped students appreciate how King Rama V shaped modern Thailand and inspired leadership through compassion, intelligence, and dedication.



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### Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

#### The Thailand Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA)

- The Personal Data Protection Act B.E. 2562 (2019) (PDPA) was published on 27 May 2019 in Thailand's Government Gazette. (English, Thai)
- The PDPA is under the supervision of the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society and the main supervising authority of the PDPA is the Office of Data Protection Committee (Office).
- School is the "Data Controller" means a person or juristic person having decision-making on the collection, use, or disclosure of personal information (PDPA Section 6).

enables the identification of such person, whether directly or indirectly, but not including information of deceased persons.	<ul> <li>racial or ethnic origin</li> <li>political opinions</li> <li>religious or philosophical beliefs</li> <li>sexual behavior</li> <li>criminal records</li> <li>health data, disability</li> <li>trade union information</li> <li>genetic data, biometric data, or any data which may affect the data subject in the same manner as to be prescribed by the PDPC.</li> </ul>
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In essence, the PDPA is designed to protect a data owner from the unauthorized or unlawful collection, use, or disclosure and processing of their personal data. As with Europe's GDPR, for example, websites will have to include simple and straightforward language, and receive clear consent from each user, before (or at the time of) collecting such data, using it in any way, or passing it along to third parties.

Another key aspect under the PDPA is the requirement to inform the data subject of

(i) how their personal data will be used by the data controller, (ii) whether personal data will be disclosed to a third party, and (iii) of the data subject's rights to their personal data. This must be done at the time the personal data is being collected from the data subject.

The rights of data owners under the PDPA include the following:

- Right to be informed
- Right to access
- Right to data portability
- Right to object
- Right to erasure/ right to be forgotten
- Right to restrict of processing
- Right to rectify

Even foreign entities will need to follow the rules spelled out in the PDPA, as long as they deal with any activities that are related to the processing of personal data such as offering of goods and services or monitoring of users' online behavior, from users who are based in Thailand.

There are both criminal and civil liabilities for breaches of personal data privacy. For instance, the collection, use or disclosure of sensitive personal data illegally is liable to a fine of five million baht on conviction. Collection, use or disclosure of general personal data without a legal basis is liable to a three million baht fine on conviction, and failing to get consent from data's owner or refusing the data's owner access to their personal data is liable to a one million baht fine on conviction.

If the unauthorized use or disclosure of personal data causes damage to other people or subjects other people to hate, shame or contempt, violators may face six months in prison and/or a fine of 500,000 baht on conviction.

### Nurse: School Health Services

The Nurse Clinic is a spacious and well staffed facility at TCIS that can accommodate several students at any given time of the day. The Nurse Clinic is open daily from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The clinic is located on the ground floor next to the storeroom and staffed by a registered nurse and one nurse's aid. The clinic treats all minor injuries occurring at school. The athletics program has a school nurse who works until the sports games finish.

The clinic stays in touch with the Ministry of Public Health to keep abreast of health notifications. Current vaccination information is sent out to parents for their information and written consent. Students in grade 1 thru grade 6 may get some vaccinations from our nurse according to the Thai Ministry of Public Health. Records of previous vaccinations are kept on file with the school nurse.

A worldwide, comprehensive (24-hour) accident insurance coverage is provided for all students up to 60,000 baht yearly.
